

PREMIER DRURY VISITS CHIPPAWA

His First Trip to the Big Hydro Work

SIR ADAM WITH HIM

Will Continue Inspection of Project To-Day

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Oct. 28.—Premier Drury inspected the Hydro Chippawa development work here for the first time to-day. Sir Adam Beck, Hon. I. B. Lucas and Hon. S. Carmichael accompanied him to the intake at Chippawa, where Mr. H. Acres and other engineers answered all questions and explained the progress being made.

The premier took every opportunity to ask questions, and as one of the engineers said in an aside, "he didn't take long to grasp the essentials." Owing to speech-making appointments in Welland this afternoon and in Niagara again to-night, the tour of the Queenston end was left until to-morrow morning.

The hydro engineers are enthusiastic over the progress being made. They are seeing the beginning of the end and back up the commission's former announcement that power will be available by September 1, 1921.

To date about 65 per cent. of the dirt excavations and nearly 50 per cent. of the dock excavations have been completed. Nearly 3,000 men are on the job and a spirit of competition among them is doing much to help the work along.

C. P. R. CONDUCTOR IS ACQUITTED OF THEFT

Son Assists in Defense of David Carson—Hartley Dewart Acts as C.P.R. Counsel

TORONTO, Oct. 28.—David J. Carson, a C. P. R. passenger conductor, was acquitted by a jury on a charge of stealing tickets belonging to the company.

Carson was charged with stealing tickets of the company on July 4, 20 tickets on July 29, and 20 tickets again on August 24, the day on which he was arrested. The case was largely made up of evidence of Pinkerton's National Detective Agency, of the special investigation department of the C. P. R., and of police officers of the Toronto and Hamilton police forces.

Throughout the whole of the proceedings the young son of the prisoner, C. F. H. Carson, who is a student-at-law at Osgoode Hall, sat beside his father's counsel, T. J. Agar, assisting in the father's defense.

The crown was represented by Eric Armour, K. C., crown attorney, assisted by H. H. Dewart, K. C., who was specially retained by the C. P. R.

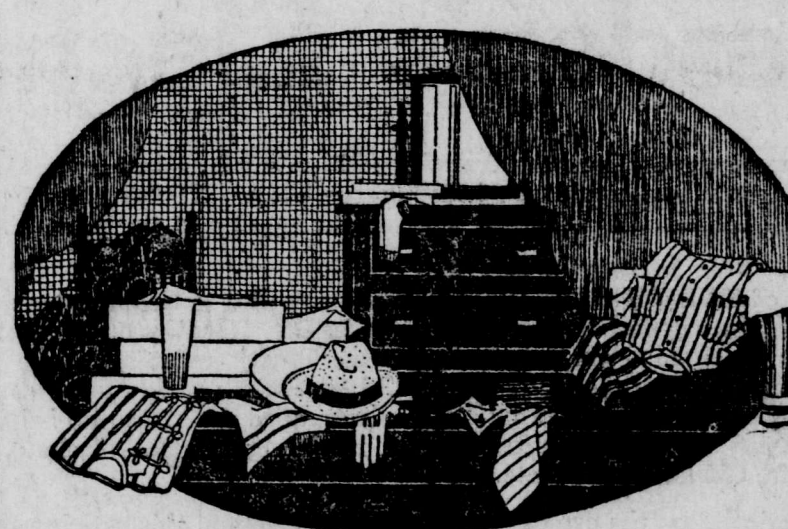
