## The Execution of Criminals.

The French are talking of abolishing the  
guillotine and of substituting some other  
means of capital punishment. The  
scientists of Paris have no faith in electro-  
cution, claiming that as a destructive agent  
illuminating gas is far more swift, sure and  
painless than electricity, and for other  
reasons also is more desirable. M.  
Berthelot is said to be strongly in favor of  
this mode of capital punishment. In Paris  
dogs are regularly asphyxiated by means of  
gas. They are placed in a box, which is  
connected with a gas pipe, and they are  
strangled soon after the gas is turned on.  
Criminals who might be asphyxiated in  
this fashion would probably suffer for some  
seconds' death would not be instantaneous.  
There would be convulsions and spasms,  
and in consequence a momentary struggle  
against asphyxia, the result of which would  
be a short spell of intense suffering. M.  
Berthelot is of opinion that there is only  
one way in which an appalling quick  
death can be insured, and that is by means  
of cyanide of potassium or prussic acid. A  
very small portion placed in a cup of tea,  
for example, produces the effect. No  
sooner is the tea drunk than the head falls  
on the pillow. The opponents of the idea  
of using gas quote the well-authenticated  
story of a man who shut himself up in a  
room with the intention of suffocating  
himself, and who took the pains to jot  
down his impressions every ten minutes.  
He told of horrible sufferings, until, finally,  
his candle went out, and he was left to die  
in darkness.

## LAMBTON COUNTY COUNCIL.

On Saturday morning the by-law regu-  
lating the county officers' salaries was pas-  
sed. Mr. McClester's amendment raising the  
jail matron's salary from \$150 to \$200 being  
voted down. By-laws to appoint Dr.  
Johnston jail surgeon; to provide for cur-  
rent expenses and to appoint Mr. R. G.  
McArthur messenger were passed. A By-  
law was passed making a grant of \$250 to  
the trustees of Sarnia General Hospital to  
assist in completing the building and an-  
other \$250 provided the trustees grant the  
use for one year from acceptance for any  
patient the council may send from the  
House of Refuge. The special committee  
on Fancher creek bridge was instructed to  
proceed no further till all the parties con-  
cerned are prepared to proceed in accord-  
ance with the terms of by-law 947. Messrs.  
Cameron, Hayne and Dewar were appoint-  
ed a committee to confer with the High and  
Public School Boards of Forest in the  
matter of the petition of Dr. Scott and  
others, and the council adjourned till the  
second Tuesday in December.
