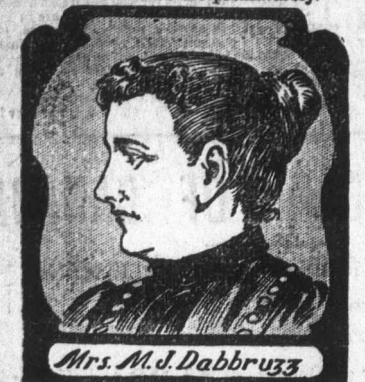

BROOKE COUNCIL.

Alvinston, August 24th, 1907.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present.

Minutes of previous meeting read, and on motion of Mr. Munroe, seconded by Mr. Spearman, were approved.

Petition received signed by W. H. Richardson and 18 others asking for a new drain on Blind Lane, between concessions 9 and 10, from the point where a proposed new drain is marked to cross 3, 4 sideroad to lot No. 9.

Spearman—Bourne, that action on this petition and for the proposed drain in the 9th con., be laid over until next meeting of council.—Carried.

Alexander Mills complained about the slowness with which the repairs to 67 sideroad drain were being made. Contractor was not pushing the work. It had caused him great loss, his crops for this year being almost ruined. Commissioner replied he had urged contractor time and again to finish job, but the delay was owing to the difficulty in procuring and keeping help.

Wm. Shugg applied for remuneration for 2 sheep killed by dogs, valued by inspector at \$18.00 and James Legg for 3 lambs killed by dogs at \$17.00.

Spearman—Munroe, that Mr. Shugg be paid the sum of \$10.67 and Mr. Legg the sum of \$11.00, being two-thirds of loss.—Carried.

Bourne—Kelly, that council open as a Court of Revision on the Gray drain No. 2 bylaw, the reeve in the chair.—Carried.

Declarations taken before clerk. Three appeals.

Asen Gray, sworn said, I have no objections to drain. We need it. My assessment though is too high.

Alex. M. Leitch, sworn said, drain is needed, but assessment too high.

Joseph Tait, as tenant of lot s w q r 19, con. 3, maintained assessment was too high and in one place drain was wrongly located.

Darvill—Kelly, that the assessment on lot s w q r 19, con. 3, be reduced \$5.00; lot e h f 19 reduced \$5.00; lot 20 reduced \$2.50; and lot n h 21, \$5.00, that these reductions, amounting to \$17.50 be added to amount payable by township, assessment changed accordingly and court closed.—Carried.

Bourne—Kelly, that council open as a Court of Revision on the Gardiner or 7th concession drain, the reeve in the chair.—Carried.

Declarations taken. 4 appeals.

Stewart Gardiner said drain was costing far too much.

Franz Lehrbass said charges were too high, and that work would interfere with his tile drains.

John Tait said drain was no benefit to his land, and did not want to be cut off from north drain.

Darvill—Monroe, that offer of Mr. Gardiner be accepted, that on payment of \$40 he would abandon all claims for damages, past or present, remove the culverts and be paid of and repair ditch in front of his lot so as to remove cause for damages.—Carried.

Agreement was then signed by Mr. Gardiner and payment made.

Spearman—Munroe, that the 67 con. road drain bylaw; the 14th con. and Kelly drains bylaw; and the bylaw to provide Brooke's share of the cost of improving the Ennis killen and Dawn townline drain be each read a third time and finally passed.—Carried, read and passed.

Reeve reported that owing to the lateness in the season and the difficulty in procuring men and material, the committee had deemed it best to postpone until another year, the building of the new bridge over the Sydenham River in first concession.

Bourne, that council do now adjourn to meet in the Village of Inwood on Saturday, the 21st day of September, 1907.—Carried.

NEGLECTED CHILDREN.

The annual report of the superintendent of neglected and dependent children, for Ontario has just been issued. The reports show that during the year 1906, a larger number of children have been saved from evil surroundings, and placed in foster homes, than in any previous years.

The superintendent Mr. J. J. Kelso says in part of his report: "It is hard to remove the impression that the Children's Aid Society exists solely for the purpose of taking children from their parents."

yet he points out a perusal, of the reports of different societies throughout the province, shows that a large part of the work is done with the intention of trying to improve the condition of children of neglected parents in their own home. When after repeated warnings, the advice of officers of the Children's Aid societies is disregarded, then as a last resort application is made for the guardianship of the children, and they are placed in foster homes. During the year 380 children were placed for the first time in foster homes by the Aid societies. In addition to the children placed for the first time, there were 325 replacements. These were all children whose foster homes were unsatisfactory, or who had themselves proved unsatisfactory to their foster parents. Nearly 4000 children are now on record. Only six deaths occurred, five being infants. All of these children are regularly visited by thoroughly qualified visitors, who bring to bear upon their work, sympathy, experience, and an ardent desire for the best interests of the children.
