





Arch. D. Moore has entered an action against the Strathroy Furniture Co., asking damages of \$500 for the loss of a thumb mangled by a machine he was working.

There will be a Beekeepers Field Day on the farm of Geo. Heblen, Dawn, lot 17, con. 7, on Tuesday, June 2nd, at 1:30, when a qualified apiary instructor will demonstrate.

Mr. and Mrs. John R. Gaynes, formerly of Alvinston, were thrown from an auto near Aurora last week. Mrs. Gaynes died soon after the accident, and Mr. Gaynes is in a critical condition.

Mr. J. H. Sexton, M. A., Athens, has been engaged as Principal of the Strathroy Collegiate Institute, in place of Mr. A. P. Cundy, resigned, at a salary of \$1,900 a year.

Chas. H. Young, the well-known Glencoe horse buyer, has bought for his own use a splendid Kentucky bred five-gaited saddle horse. The price was considerably above \$500.

Hydro demonstrations under the auspices of the Lambton Union are planned for Sarnia, Petrolia, Forest, Alvinston, Florence and other places shortly. Keen interest is being taken in the matter all through the district.

Alex. McLean, 10th con. Plympton, had a stroke of partial paralysis on Wednesday night of last week. He had gone to the barn with the lantern to attend to the stock, and Mrs. McLean's anxiety, at his long absence caused her to institute a search. While alone he had taken a stroke. He was removed immediately to the house and medical attention was summoned. He is rapidly improving.

John H. Flett, one of the pioneer inventors of oil well supplies, passed away last week at his home, Petrolia, in his 70th year. For many years he had been proprietor of one of the local oil well manufactories, through which he had won fame in oil circles. From Kirkwell, Orkney Islands, Scotland, he came direct to Petrolia 33 years ago, and as a result of his untiring efforts drilling has been greatly facilitated.

While engaged in spreading manure from a wagon in which he was standing up with his back to the horses, ex-Reeve W. W. Campbell, of Aldboro, was very seriously injured on Saturday afternoon. The team suddenly bolted, throwing Mr. Campbell backwards over the front of the wagon and upon the traces, from which he fell to the ground, the wheels passing over his legs. Both bones of his left ankle were broken, his right ankle dislocated and his back injured.

Blenheim council is in an uproar because one of the members claims a fee of

\$25 for purchasing a piece of land for the town for dumping purposes. When the resolution of the council for buying the piece of land was passed, he stepped in between, bought the land and raised the price \$25 to the town, and contends that he is within his rights, that the receiving of money by members of the council has been practiced year after year, and he was not establishing any precedent. Father Campana, after which interment took place in Mt. Calvary Cemetery. The little fellow had been in delicate health since his birth. The bereaved parents have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement. Deceased was a nephew of J. E. Callahan, of Watford.
