OBITUARY

The many friends of Mr. Albert Evoy, a former resident of Alvinston will hear with regret of his death after a very painful illness, at the Canadian Soo.—A dispatch from Sault Ste Marie, Ont., says "Albert Evoy, 182 Walnut St., this city, father of Jesse W. Evoy, 186 Spring St., passed away Tuesday, Jan. 14th, at the Royal Victoria Hospital. The late Mr. Evoy, who was 78 years old, came here from Alvinston. Another son, Colon Evoy of Calderbank, Sask., who formerly lived here and at Copper Cliff, survives him, but was unable to attend the funeral owing to illness.

Rev. I. G. Bowles, pastor of the Central Methodist church was in charge of the funeral service, held at the home of Mr. J. W. Evoy after which the remains were shipped to Strathroy for interment in the family plot where the remains of the late Mrs. Evoy, who predeceased her husband six years ago, are interred. Mr. Evoy had been employed at the ship canal since April, 1912, and six of his fellow workmen were chosen for pall bearers. Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Evoy and little daughter went to Strathroy with the remains.

The funeral was held on Friday afternoon from W. H. Tanton's undertaking parlors. The Rev. J. C. Reid conducting the last sad rites and Messrs E. Evoy, Ira Downer, Isaac Parker and Fred Rapsley acting as pall bearers.

A Sound Recommendation

Professor Swanson, head of the department of Political Science in the University of Saskatchewan, writes thus of War Savings Stamps: "I do not know of any better way of assuring the future prosperity of the country than through financing the national requirements through the purchase of these stamps. Take out a policy of insurance against Want by buying Saving Stamps Now."
This is the tribute of one of the best known young Canadian authorities on economic subjects. The War Savings Plan recommends itself to Professor Swanson and other authorities on economics, because they realize that only through saving can Canada make that industrial progress, which lies within her reach. The problem is just as much one of saving as it is of production. It is the net, not the gross, return that counts.

Campbell:—That we hereby go on record as being in favor of the resolution as passed by the Provincial Association, to wit: "that the growers be hereby asked to not sign acreage until the sugar companies come to the following terms, namely, \$10 per ton flat rate."
