Passing on from this bath our silken threads go over heated drums and spindles to be dried and twisted into larger threads. To have the silken threads we must give them color, so into the dye bath they go. This done, over the drums the colored threads pass to dry, by a route that leads to the spool or spindle. Deft fingers operate the knitting or weav-ing machine, an artist's mind con-trols those human fingers, which in turn control the forces that unfite the colored silken threads into articles of wearing apparel such as sweater coats, neckties, and stockings. 

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Needful Minerals in Feed. The common dairy feeds contain-ing the most lime are the legume hars, cowpea, clover, alfalfa and soy bean, that from cowpeas containing the most. Those which contain the most phosphorus are wheat bran, wheat middlings and lin, eed meal in the order given. None of the con-centrates contain as much lime as the legumes do, and no roughage con-tains as much phosphorus as the ron-centrates named.
