THE DISEASE SPREADS.

Feet and Mouth Ailment in a New Mass.—Chicheston section.
Boston Mass., Dec. 26.—Foot and mouth disease has been discovered among cattle in Watertown, and in Dorchester. Dr. Peters, chief of the State Bureau, also has received reports of four animals showing symptoms of the disease in Hatfield, on the Connecticut River, a section hitherto uninfected.

THE VISIBLE SUPPLY.

As compared with a week ago, the visible supply of wheat in Canada and the United States has increased 82,000 bushels; corn increased 750,000 bushels; oats decreased 150,000 bushels.
