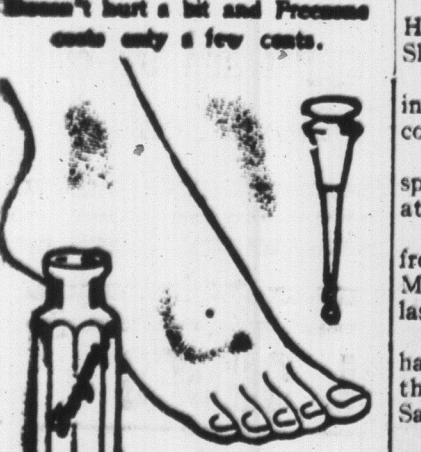
LET HER DROP
