wearers," for Europeans. Kindred and friendly tribes were often designated by their geographical position: the Nipissiriniwek, (Nipissings) and other tribes between the Ottawa and the lakes were, to the Montagnez, A'goumek" on the other side," the Indians of Maine were "of the east land" (Abnaki), to western Algonkins.

7. For Woman, some modification of the root of Chip. ikwe, Mass. esqua, 'femina,' is found in every Afgonkin language, as an inseparable generic if not as an independent name. It is the common appellation of both mulier and uxor, and its diminutive, of puella: but there are distinct names for mulier and uxor in every language, as there are also for juvencula and virgo, though Eliot does not appear to have discovered in the Massachusetts dialect either of the last two, and one has often been mistaken for the other in the compilation of vocabularies and by translators.
