

tion, the Bye-Laws of Vesper Division, No. 124, and June Rose Division, No. 125, and recommend as follows:

VESPER DIVISION, erased the word CIDER from Article 2 of the Constitution. in order—as your Committee suppose—that the members might use, or traffic in, that liquor as a beverage. This shews a want of a proper knowledge of the Constitution and Rules of the Order by that Division, and your Committee would here state for the information of *all Divisions*, that the National Division is the only power that can make alterations in the Constitution of the Order, as declared by that body in Article 11 of the Constitution of Subordinates.

Your Committee also recommend that the words “in accordance with Article 7 of the Constitution, and Article 2 of the Revised Rules” be added to section 1, of Article 5 of the Bye-Laws.

Your Committee would also recommend that instead of the Division holding their meetings on “every other Saturday evening,” they meet regularly every week, your Committee being of opinion that frequent meetings tend more to the advancement of the cause, and are more advantageous to the interests of Divisions.

JUNE ROSE DIVISION.—The words “Those entering at the later age (60) to be non-beneficial” in section 1 of Article 2 of the Bye-Laws, conflict with the Constitution, as non-benefit members are not recognised by the Order. Your Committee recommend the Division to adopt the following, instead of the clause referred to :

“Persons of old age or under disability, may be admitted in accordance with Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution for the sum of——”

Your Committee have also examined the Amendments to the Bye-laws of the Star in the East Division, No 61, and recommend that instead of the last clause of Section 1. of Art. 2, the following be substituted, for the same reasons as referred to in the Bye-Laws of June Rose Division :

“Persons of old age or under disability, may be admitted in accordance with Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution for the sum of five shillings.

The words “Constitution and,” in Section 3 of Article 4 to be omitted, as Divisions have no power to remit penalties imposed by the Constitution, which provides that the W. P.
