

when the young birds are clothed with feathers, not with down, as is usually the case. It is not unusual for the nestlings to obtain nearly a bushel of eggs at one time, from a single nest; and as they are delicious eating they are eagerly sought after as the flesh. The birds are very stupid, and easily fall a victim to the sportsman, and will sit aloft and allow a succession of shots to be fired at them until they are brought down.

A man in Rochester who has suffered from dums, makes the following proposition: That in order to save time and unnecessary trouble, he will stand one hour every day for a week at a certain corner of the town, where all who feel anxious to harass his quiet by asking impertinent questions, may have the opportunity of a hearing, always providing that the remainder of each day shall not be disturbed by applications of any kind. This plan is excellent.
