Sports Pool ticket, and we could then see whether there is a government in the free world that is more incompetent and more inclined to patronage than the Minister's.

Hon. Jacques Olivier (Minister of State (Fitness and Amateur Sport)): Mr. Speaker, speaking of patronage, perhaps I should quote what the Hon. Member's leader said a while ago. In New Brunswick he said publicly that if he were Prime Minister, he would wait fifteen years and then if there was only one Progressive Conservative left, he would appoint a Liberal. That is patronage. That is real patronage. And I am not about to get involved in that sort of thing, Mr. Speaker. All I have to say to my hon. friend opposite is: Do we have to publish names of all the people who work for Air Canada? Or the names of all the people who work for Canada Post? I do not intend to publish a list, and besides, I am told there are as many Progressive Conservatives in the Sports Pool as there are anywhere else. Except in the last election, when unfortunately, there were more Liberals than Progressive Conservatives.

GOVERNMENT POLICY

Mr. John McDermid (Brampton-Georgetown): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Prime Minister. Uniformed commissionaires who are primarily veterans have served the federal Government for a long period of time. Is there a deliberate policy now to phase them out of use at federal institutions within the country?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): No, Mr. Speaker, I know of no such policy.

LAYOFFS AT TORONTO AND MISSISSAUGA

Mr. John McDermid (Brampton-Georgetown): Mr. Speaker, would the Prime Minister personally look into the situation? All of the commissionaires at the postal operations Gateway in Mississauga have been let go. At Toronto International Airport 40 of them have been laid off and they are hiring other security forces to replace them. More layoffs are expected very shortly. These veterans rely on this income to survive because they have very low pensions. Would he personally look into the situation to assure that they are not being laid off and replaced by others?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I will be happy to look into the matter.
