It was poor tact on McCarney's part to resort to evasion of that particular description. If he had told Willard to exercise patience, and that his turn would come after a while, it would have been much better.

Then Willard's right in the connection will be saferight in the connection will be safe guarded.

The writer holds no brief for Willard, but after scanning the various reports of the contest between Jess and Luther in New York last August. I am fully persuaded that Willard should not be asked to stand aside for McCarty or any one else. The argument may be used that McCarty has improved wonderfully since he felt the force of Willard's straight lefts and uppercuts. But who shall say that Willard has not improved in a corresponding ratio?

No matter which way it is looked at there is reason for a Willard-McCarty match. It should take place either before the Wells-McCarty affair or after—providing always that McCarty defeats Wells.

An outbreak of fire at the Bank of England the other day, which was more alasming than large, was the means of letting many of the public know to their surprise that the bank is guarded every night by a detachment of Foot Guards armed with rifle and bayonet. The inception of this guard was due to the attack on the bank by the Gordon rioters in 1780, and the bank has never since that time been asked to defend itself against an enemy from without. The guard consists of a quarter of a company drawn from whatever regiment of Foot Guards may be quartered in London. It is in charge of a subattern and two non-commissioned officers. The subaltern has very comfortable quarters, and is allowed to invite two guests nightly to dinner. These guests must be out of the bank by eleven.

The fire that occurred the other day, it may be added, was the first occasion in which the guard at the bank was called to active duty during the 130 years of their existence.

GUARDING THE KAISER'S WAR CHEST

Sixty Millions of Dollars Locked Up in Tower-Carefully Counted Yearly.

We hear much of the perfection of the German military organization, especially of its preparedness for war, but little of what is perhaps its most extraordinary feature—namely, the Imperial War Fund, says Harper's Weekly. The Kaiser's war chest is kept in the Julius flower at Spandau. This fund was reserved from the French indemnity payment, and, it is said, has so increased that it now amounts to sixty millions of dollars.

It must be remembered that this vast amount has been entirely withdrawn from circulation, so to speak, and that the community loses upon it in interest something like six hundred thousand pounds, according to English estimates. The Kaiser's war fund is reported to be kept in iron chests inscribed with the names and addresses of commanders of army corps and admirals of fleets. These packages would be immediately despatched to the commanders named in the event, of war. Special sums have been set aside for commanders on the frontier in the vicinity of the outbreak of hostilities. There are also set aside special sums to be used for special purposes, such as the secret service. It is said that for the most part this treasure consists of ten and twenty mark pieces, but that there are, however, quantities of coins of all the great powers, principally France, Great Britain and Russia.

At stated times during the year all this treasure is opened, weighed and counted by army officers specially detailed by the emperor from all parts of Germany. It is a feature of the count that prior thereto these officers must give their word of honor that they do not know one another, Furthermore, altho the war funds are in charge of a special officer at the tower he is not always advised of the proceedings beforehand. In such event, it is only when the Kaiser's special deputies have finished their task that this officer is called to check up the accounts.

The defence of the tower is intrusted to the Fourth Grenadier Regiment and a battery of the Third Grenadiers. There is also stationed within the citadel the Thi We hear much of the perfection of the German military organization, especially
