



TURKS STRENGTHEN FORTS GUARDING DARDENELLES

Islands Within Straits Transformed Into Armed Camps—Trouble at Scutari.

Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to The Toronto World. ATHENS, Jan. 8.—The Turks continue to fortify the Dardanelles against an entrance by the allied fleet. Several islands within the straits have been transformed into armed camps. Forty German engineer officers are directing the work. The Turkish forces in Constantinople are estimated to number 35,000. At Scutari, in Asia Minor, an anti-government proclamation was secretly posted on walls of buildings, and the chief of police has been dismissed for failure to hold the people within bounds.
