



POTSDAM INSPIRED APPEAL FOR PEACE

Lausanne Gazette Says German Government Knows the Game's Up.

By GORDON GGORDON-SMITH. pecial Cable to The Toronto World. LUGGANO, July 5.—The attitude of

the German Socialist party in its re-lation to the German Government, is viewed with the greatest suspicion. In an article, The Gazette Lansanne declares flat-footedly that that the government was not only aware of the text of the famous appeal for peace in The Vorwartz, but encouraged its publication.

The government and the Socialists have marched han 1-in-hand, as the former hope by the latter's influence with foreign Socialists, to arouse a movement abroad against a continu-ance of the war. The German Gov-ernment and general staff declares the writer "have no longer any illu-sions as to the fate that awaits the German and Austrian armies if the war continues." No one believes that had the Ger-

man Government wished it, it could not have prevented the publication of the appeal for peace.

TO ATTACK ZEPPELINS WITH EXPLOSIVE DARTS. A new weapon that has just been invented in Ireland for use against Zeppelins consists of an explosive dart intended to be dropped from an aeroplane. The dart is made of steel ard is fitted at the rear end with projections much like fishhooks. In-side the dart is an explosive charge projections much like fishhooks. In-side the dart is an explosive charge which burns with a sharp flame. When a dart is dropped on a Zeppe-lin, or other gas balloon, the hooks catch in the fabric after the point has repetrated it and pull back a detunpenetrated it and pull back a deton-ator that sets off the charge. As the explosion takes place inside the gas bag the effect can hardly be any-thing but disastrous.
