WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old. may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Madicoba. Saskatchewan or A'berta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain-conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of instending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his nomestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter prother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongsade his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (Industing the time requaired to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of inree years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
