Note and Comment

T. Rennie wins the single-rink championship for 1914, and this places Granites a tie with Queen City for the Canada Life Trophy at three wins each. Last year was the only break outside these two clubs, when H. H. Chisholm won for Lakeview, but he went down this year his very first game.

The final was a splendidly-played contest. The curling was well up to the standard of any final. Skip Armstrong and his men never faltered, while the Rennie rink played superbly from lead to pilot; otherwise the trophy would have gone to Parkdale.

There was nothing spectacular in the sixteen ends. Both sides played the draw game, and not a stone was hogged during the contest. Instead of running out short, the order on both sides was to come to the stone with the aid of sweeping. Rennie took a lead with a big four the sixth end, and thereafter always remained in front.

But Skip Armstrong would not permit of any runaway race, and even the last end, when five down, he was building up nicely for the necessary shots, when J. Rennie spilled the beans, leaving out three with his second stone. However, Armstrong was on the spot, counting two and ending up only three down.

A comparison of the records of the final competitors is interesting. The first rink to Parkdale to have a shade on the Granites, Armstrong had a fraction more points himself, and also, he was down a fraction better. But, unless you continue past the decimal point, the ships are even. The Rennie rink drew a bye in the preliminary. Following are the records:

The original single-rink trophy, the Walker Gold Vase, was won by the Canadians, and they, ending the final five times in nine years, with Rennie skip, J. Rennie, T. Rennie and A. B. Nichols. The other winners were G. H. Gooden, ham (Granites), E. Badenach (Granites), J. C. Scott (Queen City), and W. E. McMurphy (Granites).

In 1913 there was no trophy, but the clubs curled all the same, the final being won by J. Rennie skip, Rennie, J. George and J. Watson representing the Canadians.

Tom Rennie's rink lost the opening game they played to Varsity in the tankard primary, Wilson pulling them out. Since then they are undefeated. H. H. Chisholm won from them twice last year with C. O. Knowles not in the line-up. Saturday's defeat was the first for S. H. Armstrong's team since their organization last winter.

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CLEVER CURLING IN FINAL FOR CITY CHAMPIONSHIP

T. Rennie Defeats S. H. Armstrong on Keen Queen City Ice by 15 to 12.

The Granites rink, skipped by T. Rennie, won the final game for the championship of the city from S. H. Armstrong of Parkdale Saturday night on Keen Queen City ice, by 15 shots to 12. A crowd of a couple of hundred watched the play. The curling was steady all round. Armstrong netted two the fifth and made it a tie. He also had the better of the top play the sixth, but vice and skip turned the tables. T. Rennie coming to Parkdale's second shot with the out-turn wicked in, and counted four. Eatons Have Speed On Parkdale and Win in Good Style

WEST TORONTO, Jan. 14.—Over 1500 spectators watched the Senior O. H. A. game between Eatons and Parkdale at the Ravina Rink on Saturday night. The game was probably one of the fastest and best specimens of senior hockey which will be seen this season, and, although the Parkdales were unfortunate last night, the return game will probably reverse the score. At Ravina, however, the best team certainly won, for the Eatons showed superior hockey throughout the game and in the last half better training than the canoe men.

Parkdales were unfortunate in having one of the best men off last night, Ridd, being on the sick list. McClaren, a new man, played left wing in his place. A surprise was also shown in the Eaton line-up, for Matthews replaced Leroux at right, while Bremner did not appear at all. Matthews and Foyton worked well together, however, and, with Meeking at centre, presented an aggressive forward line, and prevented the Eaton defence from stopping multitudes of hot ones, and he was well defended by Hyland at point and Jerry Laflamme at cover. Rankin and Laflamme were by all odds the best men on the Eaton team, and worked to some surprising effect.
