Ottawa, Sept. 19 .- The new board of commerce appointed by the government to curb profiteering and take other steps for decreasing the cost of living in Canada came in for some severe criticism at the hands of members on both sides in the house of mons today. Dr. Michael Clark of Red Deer started the adverse comment when he rose to speak on a resolution providing for an amendment to the board of commerce act to fix the sal-aries of the chairman at \$10,000, and of the other two members at \$8000 each. Judging by the "economic antics" of one of the members of the board, said Dr. Clark, the money spent on it was being worse than wasted. This commissioner, he said, had ac-tually gone the length of threatening

to forbid exports, a proposal which would suggest that he was on the verge of "economic insanity."
Mr. Donald Sutherland thought that Mr. Donald Sutherland thought that an inquiry should be made into statements appearing in the newspapers and credited to Commissioner W. F. O'Connor. He declared that the prohibition of the export of hides, on the recommendation of the board of commerce, had resulted in tens of thousands of animals being shipped to the United States where hides commanded a higher price.
