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PRIVATE BILLS.

A List of Applications for Legislation at the Approaching Session of the Legislature. The private bill legislation of the approaching session of the Ontario Legislature will be unusually heavy.

Artesian Water Supply & Power Company—For act of incorporation. Toronto Junction town—For act to consolidate debtors.

Brantford city—For act to confirm by-law No. 488, granting aid to the Toronto, Hamilton & Buffalo Railway, and for act to legalize the issue of debentures.

Collingwood and Thornbury—For act to legalize and confirm a certain agreement. Cobourg, Northumberland & Pacific Railway—For act to ratify and confirm certain municipal by-laws granting aid.

Chatham Water Works Company—For act to increase the capital stock and to enable the borrowing of money. Clarke, Frederick Henry—For act enabling him to practice as an apothecary or chemist and pharmacist.

Exeter village—For act to empower the issue of debentures. For William town—For act to amend act of incorporation and for act to amend cap. 82, 85 Vic, respecting the operation of an electric street railway.

French River, Sault Ste. Marie & Lakes Water Supply Railway Company—For act of incorporation. Guelph city—For act to authorize the issue of debentures.

Gananoque town—For act to legalize and confirm a by-law relating to the Thousand Islands Railway Company. Hamilton city—For act authorizing the issue of debentures.

Hamilton Street Railway—For act to amend act of incorporation. Hamilton Radial Electric Railway—For act of incorporation or confirmation under charter.

Leggsville town—For act to consolidate debtors. Kingston city—For act to grant or lease to the corporation in trust for the purpose of a public square certain buying grounds in the city.

Kingston School of Mining—For act of incorporation. Kingston, Smith's Falls & Ottawa Railway—For act to confirm certain by-laws and for other purposes.
