METAL TRADES FEDERATION

International Machinists Will Confer With Other Bodies in St. Louis to Form Strong Combination.

NINE-HOUR DAY ON RAILWAYS.

Convention To-day Will Take Action and Fix Date for Inauguration of This Movement.

A feature of the business transacted at yesterday's session of the Machinists' Association was the adoption of a resolution instructing the president to appoint two representatives to meet with two representatives from each of the Metal Associations in St. Louis next month for the purpose of forming a National Metal Trades Federation to combat any hostile action that may be taken by the manufacturers, who are combining against the metal trade workers. The federation will embrace the blacksmiths, molders, patternmakers and boilermakers. The reason given for the organization of such a league is that under the present conditions each body is prevented from assisting the others in going out on a sympathetic strike.

The amendments to the Grand Lodge constitution were completed. The principal changes are the increase in dues, the appointment of five vice-presidents, and the improving of the financial system. Many of the delegates were very much satisfied with the results of the convention.

Addresses were also given by Vice-President J. A. Flett and Secretary Draper of the Trades Congress of Canada, and by the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, who presided over the session.

A pleasing feature of the morning session was the presentation of a gold watch, suitably inscribed, to Miss Bradley of Washington, D.C., official stenographer of the association.

The presentation was made by J. J. Creamer on behalf of the delegates, and a telegram of sympathy was read from the International Association of Steam Fitters and the International Association of Shipbuilders.

To-day the convention will discuss the railway situation, and a day will probably be set for the inauguration of the nine-hour day on all railways.

Last night the visiting delegates, with their wives and friends, were treated to a moonlight excursion on the Steamer Corona.

All the shops in Hartford, 15 in number, one shop in Buffalo and one in Philadelphia have granted the required concessions.

Situation at Depew.

Buffalo, N.Y., June 7.—The New York Central Railroad officials have posted notices in their shops at Depew, to the effect that all employees who have absented themselves from work of late without leave must report Monday morning if they desire to remain in the company's employ.

To-night the striking machinists will meet to take action on the decision of the latter national Association that they struck locally and ordering the men back to work. It is probable they will vote to return to work.
