## CITY NEWS.

An Overdraft of \$10,000.  
The monthly board meeting of the House of Industry was held yesterday afternoon, Rev. John Gillespie presiding. The superintendent reported 163 inmates in the institution; 11 were admitted, 9 left, and 2 died during the month. The report of the Out-door Poor Committee shows 184 families relieved, including 380 children. Supplies distributed were: Coal, 2121-20 tons; 120 bushels coke; 241-2 cords wood; 1291 4-lb. leaves bread; 1228 lbs. rice; 1228 lbs. oatmeal; 664 lbs. sugar; and 166 lbs. tea. One hundred and seventy gallons of soup have been given daily to needy ones. One hundred and four orders were issued for work test for fuel, and 39 performed the required work. The Casual Poor Committee reported 124 admitted for 1203 nights. The stone broken by Canada was 13 toise. The treasurer's statement shows an overdraft of \$7071.84.

Express Employees' Dinner.  
The Board of the Express Company on Monday evening was the scene of a very pleasant social function, it being the occasion of an annual dinner of the clerical staff of the employees of the Canadian Express Company in the Toronto office. For Sweet Charity.  
The eighteenth annual meeting of the Toronto Savings Bank "Charitable Trust" was held at St. John's Grove, 174 Beverley-street, on Monday evening, Feb. 18, 1902. The Rev. Dr. H. H. Morrison presiding. Thomas Flynn, Hugh T. Kelly, John Ryan and M. O'Connor, members of the board, were also present.

It was resolved that the sum of \$4000 be taken from the maintenance of the trust for distribution among the charities, and the treasurer, Mr. M. O'Connor, was requested to apportion the same in the following manner: House of Providence, \$100; Orphanage at Sunnyside, \$100; St. Nicholas' Institute, \$100; St. Michael's Hospital, \$100; Good Shepherd, \$100; Parkdale, \$100; House of Industry, \$100.


The many friends of Mrs. John Grieve will hear with regret of her death about 9 o'clock last night. Deceased had been ill only a short time.
