An Overdraft of \$10,000.

The monthly board meeting of the House of Industry was held yesterday afternoon, Rev. John Gillespie presiding. The superintendent reported 168 inmates in the institution; 17 were admitted, 9 left, and 2 died during the month. The report of the Out-Door Poor Committee shows 184 families relieved, including 380 children. Supplies distributed were: Coal, 212 1-20 tons; 120 bushels coke: 241-2 cords wood; 6791 4-lb. loaves bread; 1328 lbs. rice; 1328 lbs. oatmeal; 664 lbs. sugar, and 166 lbs. tea. One hundred and seventy gallons of soup have been given daily to needy ones. One hundred and four orders were issued for work test for fuel, and 39 performed the required work. The Casual Poor Committee reported 124 admitted for 1203 nights. The stone broken by casuals was 13 toise. The treasurer's statement shows an overdraft of \$7791.84. EWELLERY ES, ETC.
