New York, Nov. 22.—The Tribune's London correspondent cables:
How much weight fiscal arguments have with the working people it is impracticable to determine. The attendance at the meetings of all parties and factions is large, and enthusiasm is always infectious. Mr. Chamberlain continues to put life and sparkle into the canvass and keeps his antagonists fully employed answering him.

His ples for a special referendum of the Swiss pattern on the fiscal question is naturally inspired by a desire to exclude from the polls the voters who insist upon casting a vote of censure against the government education policy or the conduct of the Boer war.

His attempt to convert the compliments of the agents general of the colonies into testimony that the self-governing commonwealths of the empire had forced the fiscal question upon the Mother Country revives the rumor that he will visit Canada n the spring or the summer for the sake of obtaining moral support of his preferential tariff scheme.

Mr. Chamberlain has been remarkably effective thruout the canvass from Glasgow to Cardiff, but he has not yet converted the country. He has made a good start, says one most loyal henchman, but has a long way to go.

Mr. Chamberlain remains the chief organizer on the Unionist side. He has appealed for a campaign fund of £100,000 with which to complete the education of the English people in the economics of Imperialism, and will probably get it, for many capitalists, shipowners, manufacturers and bankers are among the heartiest supporters of retaliation and preference tariffs. This will be the first instalment. Cobden collected £400,000 for the Anti-Corn League, and Mr. Chamberlain will require an equal sum for undoing the work of the free trade champion. Presses are already groaning under the weight of fiscal literature, and there is a full muster of partisan orators night after night on the Liberal side.





It may be said in general terms that the rapprochement now existing between Italy and Great Britain is much closer and more friendly, altho not imposing the same technical treaty obligations that exist between Italy and other members of the triple alliance. The same process of disinteragation, if one may use that term, has taken place in the French relations with Russia to an extent much more serious than is yet apparent.

It would be gross exaggeration to say that the Franco-Russian alliance is indanger of dissolution in the near future, but it is true that the honds uniting the two countries have already become more technical than sentimental. There is an equal probability of divorce under such conditions in a national alliance as in matrimonial ones. It becomes clear almost daily that as the dual and triple alliances lose their most important element of cohesion the ties become stronger between Italy, France and Great Britain. This new unratified grouping of powers is partially offset by the understanding between Russia and Germany. It is argued by some who have studied the rival interests of the two countries that it will be impossible for that combination to become general or permanent, because the commercial relations of Russia and Germany cannot be harmonized. The German agrarian conditions are almost as bad as the Russian and it will be impossible to arrange a commercial treaty between these two powers.
