EPISODE OF CAMP LIFE. New York, May 10.-Tents were swept away, flags whipped into ribbons, and sentries blown from their feet, by a terrible gale which howled through Camp Black, at Hempstead Plains, during the early hours of Sunday. Groping about in torrents of rain, and drenched to the skin, a quarter of the camp's population was left uncovered. In the fury of the storm men plunged through the mud of the camp streets in the darkness, tripping in the meshes of the tent ropes and saw thir surroundings only by blinding flashes of lightning. There were no serious casualties.

WHY SO FEW AMERICANS WERE INJURED.

Washington, May 10.-The remarkable disparity between the casualties on the American and Spanish ships, as shown by the Dewey reports, is a source of special comment, and the military attache of one of the embassies said such a disparity probably was without a parallel in history.
