In the United States "apartments" are suites of rooms in large, handsome buildings, where families can do their own cooking or take their meals in a public restaurant. In the United States "flats" are apartments in small and unfashionable tenement-houses. In London no gentleman or lady of position would live in "apartments," for that term is applied to quarters in boarding-houses and to residences in the unfashionable quarters of the city where they rent rooms to lodgers. Suites of rooms in the large and expensive apartmenthouses, or "mansions" or "residential hotels," are called "flats." It is simply a difference in the application of the English language, just as they call


