

QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send In Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser

D. M. T.: Q .- I was examined in Owen Sound last fall and categorized A2 but was given exemption while farming. I am 20, and when the new regulations were passed ! went to Toronto and enlisted in the 67th Battery, but when I was examined the doctor would only give me C3. What should I do? Must

me C3. What should I do? Must
I report for service?
A.—If notified to report you must do
so, and then you will receive another
examination, and your future will depend on that. The registrar's office
would have no record of the fact that
you had been place in C3, and you call
you up as an A man. However, if you
actually became a member of the battery, and then were given a discharge
certificate, the registrar would probably be notified, or if not, you would
only need to show your discharge certificate when you reported.

A. E. D.: Q.—I was placed in D last fail, but was re-examined lately and placed in A. I have a certificate from the doctor that I am at present unfit for service on account of illness last fail. Could I have another examination if I ask for it before I am called?

A.—As you are over the ages in which examptions are cancelled, you will be examptions are cancelled, you will be A.—As you are over the ages in which exemptions are cancelled, you will be given an opportunity to present any claims for exemption you may have, and then, if you cannot prove them, you will be called. It is unlikely that you would obtain another examination, though you might lay the claim of ill-health before the tribunal.

A. A. H.: Q.-1. What date did the new order-in-council take effect?

2. I am in A2. 28 years old, and my exemption expired on May 1. Does my exemption still hold good under the new act, which calls the men between 20 and 22 only.

3. My employer, a farmer, applied for an extension of time to the deputy registrar, and has not received a reply. Can I be called before I hear of same?
