Tidal Wave at Hawaii

Honolulu, Aug. 17.-10 p.m.-Wireless reports from the Islands of Hawaii, Maui, and Hilo, report a tidal wave, the general height of which was five feet.

In the inclosed Bay of Maalaea, on the Island of Maui, its height was estimated to be twelve feet, where it carried

The first 20,-000 shares of Union Pacific reported were sold simultaneously all the way from 1811-2 to 185. compared with 1781-2 at the close last night, and 1793-4 as the highest price yesterday. Running sales at the opening of 25,000 shares of Southern Pacific were made at 89 and 90 3-4, compared with 871-2 at the close last night, and with 89 as vesterday's top price. In Pennsylvania 10.000 shares sold at 145 to 145 1-2, compared with 1435-8 last night, and as many shares of U.S. Steel changed hands at 43 7-8 and 44 1-4, compared with 431-2 last night.
