Board of Education Adjusts Salary Schedule.

No increases in salaries were voted by the board of education at a special neeting yesterday afternoon, save for male principals of schools of twelve

male principals of schools of twelverooms and over, and male assistants. The others were refused.

The salaries of male principals in twelve-room schools and over will be from \$1,400 to \$2,000. It was formerly \$1,300 to \$1,800.

The male principals of seven to twelveroom schools will be from \$1,300 to \$1,800. This is no change. The salaries of principals of from four to seven rooms will be \$1,200 to \$1,600. This was amended to make women eligible for positions as principals of these schools

schools

The minimum salary of women teachers will be \$550, an increase of \$50. All teachers engaged in 1917 will receive \$600, so that the change will make no difference. The maximum will be \$900, the same as at present. The women asked for a minimum of \$600, and a maximum of \$1,200.

The salaries of male assistants of 12-room schools and over will be from \$1,000 to \$1,400. This is an increase of \$200 in the maximum. 000 to \$1,400. This is an increase of 00 in the maximum.

The increases will be at the rate of \$50 per annum. Manual training rooms, domestic science rooms and swimming pools will be classed as rooms.

J. A. Sullivan of Hamilton addressed the members of the Independent Labor party at the opening meeting of the association held in the trades and labor association held in the trades and labor council rooms last night.
