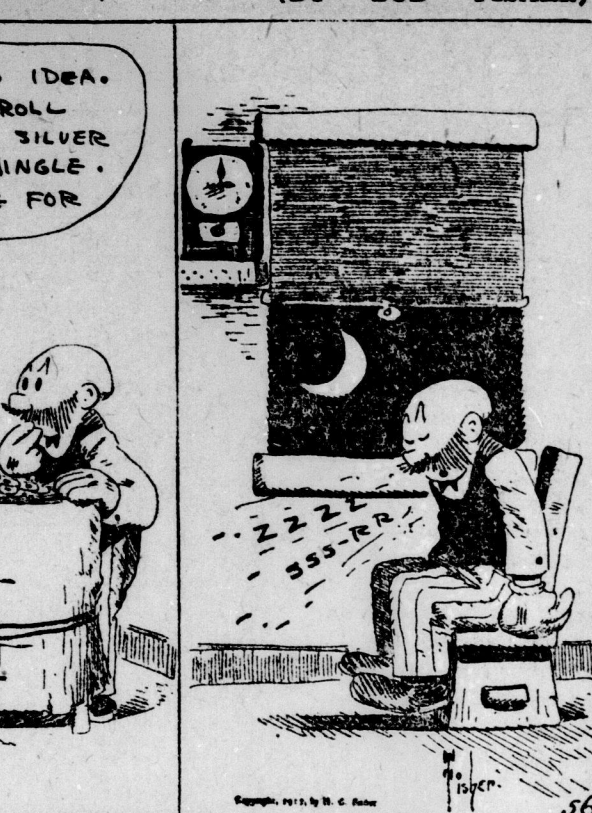
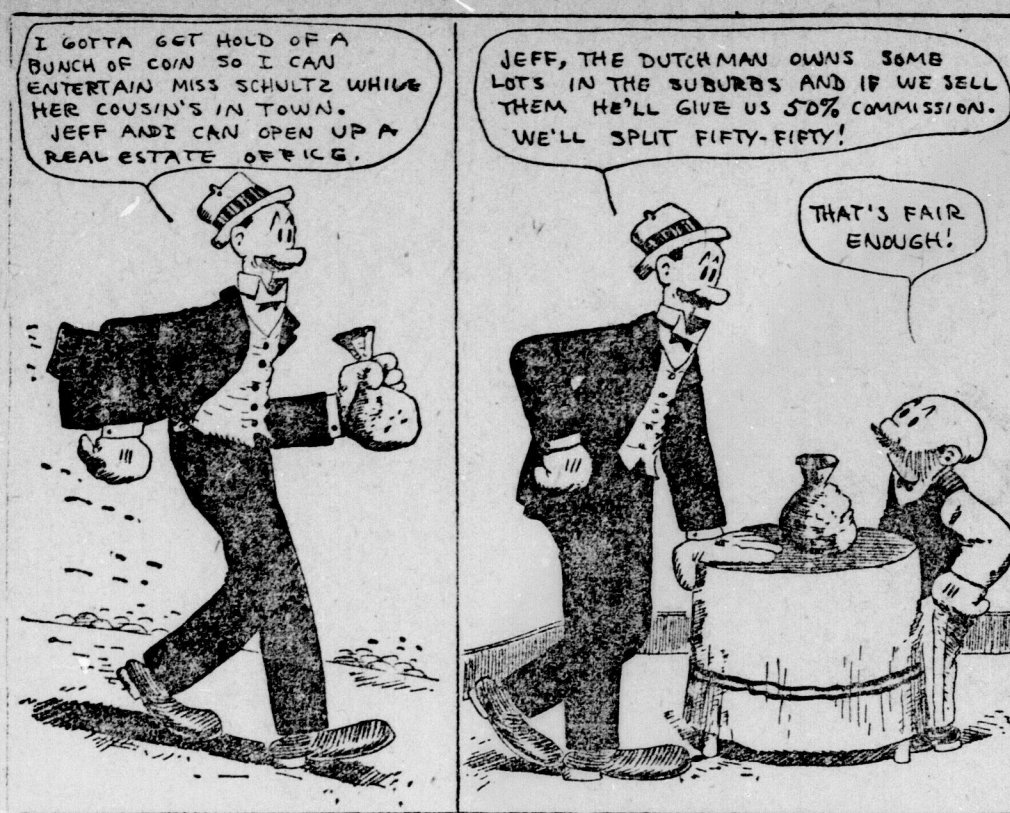

NEW ORGANIZATION REPLACES O.H.A. AT MONTREAL MEETING

Quebec Drops Out and Toronto Gets Franchise in Big Ice League.

[Special to The Advertiser.] MONTREAL, Nov. 26.—Following several lengthy sessions held in Montreal, the new governing body for professional hockey, to replace the National Hockey Association, which recently suspended operations, was launched at a meeting at the Windsor Hotel here this noon, at which five teams were represented. Quebec has finally decided to drop out, and Toronto has been given a franchise for this season.

The inauguration of the new organization is a revival of the National Hockey Association under the name of the National Hockey League, and was apparently a move to bring about a change in the ownership and management of the Toronto club more than anything else.

The constitution of the new league, the same as that of the N. H. A., while the playing rules will be almost unaltered.

Toronto are well supplied with players, while Ottawa has signed the majority of their men up, and Canadians are in as good a position as a year ago. The only man they will lose will be Noble, who played with them after the Toronto club was suspended, and after that the following is the manner in which the players set free by the withdrawal of the Quebec club have been allotted:

Wanderers were given Donald Ritchie, Carey and Mark. Canadians were given Joe Malone, Joe Hall and Walter Munro; Toronto gets Harry Munro and S. Johnson, Ottawa being given "Rusty" Crawford.

J. Quinn, former manager of Quebec, is president of the new league. Frank Calder, who was secretary of the N.H.A., was elected to the dual position of president and secretary of the new association.

Rumors are floating around town to the effect that London will have a junior team this winter. This said that a local athletic club will put a collection of kids on ice.

At their meeting on December 4 the Northern Hockey League will consider widening their scope in order that players can play with the nearest town or village.

The very latest add-up of the 2:10 list makes the total 63.

H. K. Devereaux, president of the Grand Circuit, who was injured this fall while driving, is reported to be on the mend. Mr. Devereaux is able to team his automobile, so he must be pretty well on the way to complete recovery.

It looks to us as if Miller Huggins had a man-sized job on his hands building up the Yankees. He must build up the bottom up.

Huggins is new to the American League. He knows the National, but is not even acquainted with some of his own Yankees. Miller has the reputation of being a revisioner of baseball players; now is his chance to show just what he can do in this line.

It takes more than a large number of ball players to win a pennant in the National League. The 1917 Pirates used more athletes than any other club in the organization, but they finished last. Managers Cagman and Beazak employed the services of nine pitchers, five catchers, 17 infielders and ten outfielders, a total of 41. Chicago ranked next with 35 players, six pitchers, 11 infielders and eight outer gardeners, a total of 37. The Phillies employed the most players having seven pitchers, only three backstops, nine infielders and five outfielders, a total of 24. Cincinnati called up 29 men, Brooklyn, 31; New York, 33; St. Louis, 33, and Boston, 34.

Battle King, who travelled the Michigan shortstop last summer, was sold for \$600 at the Old Glory auction in New York a few days ago.

Football rule makers are considering the idea of banning the goal from touchdown. Several games had been won by the jockey point collected in this manner. Authorities contend that too much depends on one player's kicking rather than on the team as a whole.

It has been suggested that if the rule is retained the kick should be made from a scrimmage formation where there would be a real chance to block it, and where all members of the rival teams could take part in the play.

Every day almost brings news of some player called to the army being elevated above his fellows in the ranks. Among the latest for promotion is Walter Smallwood, the international League pitcher taken on by the Yankees, only to be sent to service. He has been made a sergeant.
