MORE GOOD ROADS PLANNED AT WABASH

Cost of Work Is Estimated at \$25,000 Per Mile.

WABASH, Jan. 28.—A business meeting in connection with the cementing of the Base Line, which connects Wallaceburg, Drosser and Thamesville, was held on Monday evening in the Wabash Foresters' Hall. Quite a number were present, including Reeve Russell Holmes, and subscriptions were taken to be used in the furtherance of the work.

The roadways along the highway from Wallaceburg completed three miles of cement roadway last spring, and intend to lay as many more during the coming season.

The work is estimated at \$25,000 per mile, and the aim is to collect 20 per cent of cost from the municipalities, 20 per cent from the county, and to press the Government for the remaining 60 per cent.

A successful clearance sale of stock, implements, grain and poultry was held yesterday afternoon on the farm of Russell Ross, just east of Thamesville. W. J. Cryderman was auctioneer, and nearly everything was sold at a good price.

One team of work horses went at \$500; milch cows at from \$75 to \$300; young shoots at \$17.50 each and down at \$7.50 each. Chickens were sold at \$1.39 each. Stocks of corn went at \$1.44. Total proceeds of sale amounted to almost \$5,000.

Mr. Ross sold his farm to John McDowell of Zone, who takes possession by May 1.

HENSALL CHURCH HAD A PROSPEROUS YEAR
Splendid Reports Presented at Meeting of Carmel Presbyterians.

HENSALL, Jan. 28.—At the annual congregational meeting of Carmel Presbyterian Church a most satisfactory report of the year's work was presented by the treasurer, W. Hemphill. Reports of the session, managing board, Sabbath school, Young People's Improvement Society, Ladies' Aid, and other societies connected with the church were given, and were of a very encouraging nature. The missionary offerings spoke well for the zeal of the congregation, and the Women's Missionary Society and the Mission Band also gave liberally.

Officers of the past year were re-elected. The board of managers, however, was enlarged, and includes John Craig, Alex. Munn and Lorne Laiker. William McKay was again appointed clerk and envelope secretary; James W. Bonthron, congregational secretary, and A. W. R. Hemphill, church treasurer.

The meeting was very largely attended, and a very pleasant one throughout. The pastor, Rev. Mr. McConnell, was chairman, and emphasized the good work done by the congregation during the year, as evidenced by the reports.

A vote of thanks was moved and seconded and carried by the entire congregation, acknowledging the splendid services given by the church choir and the splendid cantata recently given.

THROWN FROM BUGGY NEAR MUIRKIRK
Duart Man Hurlled Headfirst to Road When Horse Is Frightened.

DUART, Jan. 28.—Willis Lewis, assistant to Dr. J. R. Macpherson, was thrown from a buggy at Muirkirk and had his face badly bruised and cut. The horse became unmanageable at the approach of a train, and upset the rig, pitching Lewis out on his head.

Though partially stunned, he managed to hang on to the lines and succeeded in controlling the animal.

Duart has lost its oldest citizen, in the death of Mrs. Thomas Peets, who passed away on Wednesday in her 89th year. She was a lifelong resident of the district. In 1910 she had a remarkable health for a person of such advanced years, but owing to a fall and sustaining a fracture of the hip, she was confined to her bed for many months.

Reports rendered at the annual meeting of the congregation to be in a flourishing condition. The membership roll shows a substantial gain, and the financial report shows the church to have met every obligation during the year with a balance to the good.

The community evening given in the hall by the Duart Women's Institute was very successful in every way. The feature of the entertainment was a debate on the immigration question, which was well taken up, and provided a source of knowledge to those present.

The hall was crowded, \$60 being taken in at the door. A dance followed the literary part. Guests were present from Thamesville and Wardsville.

STROKE IS FATAL TO ISAAC BELL
RIDGETOWN, Jan. 28.—The death took place at the family residence, Talbot street, of one of Howard Township's best known and most prominent farmers, in the person of Isaac S. Bell, 83.

Mr. Bell spent his whole life on two farms near here. He was trained to the practical duties of agriculture and was a most successful farmer. He helped to clear the section in which he lived, and was at all the hardships of the pioneers. He was a Conservative in politics, but was a man of broad views. In January, 1861, he married Miss Cynthia E. Smith of London, a daughter of Edward and Ann Smith, the former of whom was a prominent London stock dealer. A family of six children was born to them, two of whom, Clarence E. and Isaac P., died.

Mr. Bell suffered a paralytic stroke about two weeks ago. His wife survives, also one son, Wheeler, who lives on the homestead. It is expected the funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon to Greenwood Cemetery.

BOND DEALERS ASK THAT GOVT. LOAN BE RAISED
TORONTO, Jan. 28.—Bond dealers today waited upon Hon. Peter Smith, asking that the recent \$10,000,000 loan, which has been over-subscribed, be increased. The bond dealers reported that there was considerable money available. The provincial treasurer favors increasing the loan, and an announcement to this effect may be expected very shortly.

EXCEED OBJECTIVE IN CARADOC DRIVE
DELAWARE, Jan. 28.—At the annual congregational meeting of Sonoma Caradoc Presbyterians, held in the church on Muncey road, a report of the recent canvass of the congregation was made and showed that in the delayed canvass for the forward movement with an objective of \$300, \$350 has been promised. It is expected that the envelope system is being introduced and \$700 has been promised for general revenue and \$150 for missions for 1921.

The report for the past year showed 37 families, 55 communicants. The

DOING GOOD WORK
Reports Show North Caradoc Church Is in Flourishing Condition.

Mount Brydges, Jan. 28.—At the annual meeting of North Caradoc Presbyterian Church, the pastor, Rev. G. M. Chidley occupied the chair. The reports showed a prosperous year. CHANCES SLIM FOR TARIFF BILL

Indications That Fordney Measure Will Not Pass This Session.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 28.—Indications in the Senate today were that the Fordney emergency tariff bill would not be passed at the present session of Congress.

On Monday the Senate is to take up the big appropriation bills, and advocates of the bill admit that it will be difficult to get it up for discussion again, once it has been set aside.

The bill was again before the Senate today, but no progress was made, and filibustering was openly charged. Senator King, Democrat, Utah, occupied the time today by a lengthy speech on Russian trade.

The open charge of filibustering was made by Senator Ashurst, Democrat, Arizona, but did not deter a number of opponents of the bill from declaring their intention to speak tomorrow, nominally on the Fordney measure, but actually on matters not closely connected with that bill.
