EAST TORONTO.
Father of Chief of Police Tidsberry Dies in Manitoba.
EAST TORONTO, April 30.—A telegram received here to-day conveyed the news of the death at High Bluff, Thursday of George Tidsberry, father of Chief Constable Tidsberry of East Toronto, and a former well known resident of Scarborough township. The late Mr. Tidsberry was 84 years of age. Born in Scotland he came to Canada when a young man and settled for a time in Pickering, and later in Scarborough. Some 34 years ago he removed to High Bluff, Man., where he has since resided. He is predeceased by his wife 12 years, and is survived by a family of nine children. They are, Daniel in Edmonton, Annie and Frank in Portland, Ore., George in Boston, Mass., Agnes, John, Robert, and Matthew in Manitoba and James in East-Toronto. The remains will be interred at High Bluff.
To-morrow (Friday) is the last day for the payment of the dog taxes for the town to avoid extra expense.
The death of Charles Torrance, for the past three years associated with Fred March in the drug business on Danforth-avenue, took place at the home of his mother to-night. Deceased was only 29 years of age, and was a great favorite in town where he was well known. He was prominently identified with the Sunday school work

Dr. Torrington, Thru Illness, Was Absent—Arrests at Sutton—Suburban News.

WEST TORONTO, April 30.—The festival chorus held in Victoria Presbyterian Church to-night was in every respect save the absence of the honored leader Dr. Torrington, a great success. Prevented by illness from taking charge of the work which he had brought to such a high state of perfection his place was ably supplied by Mr. Blakey of Sherbourne-street Methodist Church choir. The choir throut the evening gave abundant of the finest music received and all the numbers were heartily encored. The soloists were Ruthven Macdonald, Mr. Taylor, Miss Ashworth, Miss Casey and Miss Ferris. Miss Kate Ellis was prevented thru illness from taking part.
The efforts of the directors in establishing the chorus and seeking to promote high class music in town is thoroughly appreciated as shown by the large attendance present.

There is a proposal that the new Carnegie library be built on West Annette-street. Several available sites on this handsome thoroughfare are under consideration by the members of the council. This location is considered about as desirable as any in the city, and would be convenient to most of the reading public. It is supposed that about \$1500 will be spent on the site.
Altho, the new library board will soon be appointed the old board will continue in charge of the present library until the end of the year. The new board will consist of three members appointed by council and three by the school board. It will exercise full control over the construction operations of the new building. No member of council will be qualified to sit on the board.
Fire destroys a box of clothing in Police Magistrate Ellis' residence on Evelyn-crescent about 11 o'clock this morning. The origin is unknown, but the damage did not exceed \$100. A particularly unfortunate circumstance is the annoyance the fire caused Miss Gillespie, who is staying with Mr. Ellis' family, and who was ill in the house at the time.

WEXFORD.
York and Scarborough Townline in Bad Shape at Wexford.


