"In response to my appeal I have in the bank \$389, but the estimate for the repairs and improvements is \$2550 and this sum I am most anxious to raise. The work is nearly completed, i.e., the excavation and drainage of basement, a new furnace, proper plumb-

the whole building in brick. The sisters hope to occupy it and dispense good cheer and help at Christmas, and they are anxious to open it free from debt, as it has always been for the past seventeen years, during which time, it

Money was borrowed to start the work so that the poor might be help-ed during the coming winter, and al-ready there are indications that there will be many calls on the sisters. 


