SCRUTINY OF BALLOTS REFUSED BY JUDGE

Setback to Cataract Program—Proceedings in City Council—A Day's Doings

HAMILTON, July 12.—(Special.)—The first hope of the Kinrade jurors to get extra fees vanished this evening when the city council decided not to make them any special allowance, the government having declined to do anything for them. It was decided, provided a satisfactory agreement for one year could be obtained, to instruct John Montgomery, who is installing a pump for the mountain waterworks system, to put in a 50 horse-power motor suitable for using Cataract power. It was stipulated that this would not affect the city's case in the courts in any way, and that the power was not to be taken under the alleged contract with the Cataract power company.

LOSES LIFE IN VAIN EFFORT TO SAVE DROWNING GIRL.

MONTREAL, July 12.—(Special.)—Edward Marchand, a bartender, and an English girl, Lillie Corias, who had only been in the country a short time, were drowned near the shore this afternoon on Lake St. Louis. The young woman fell out of the boat in about 12 feet of water and in trying to save her Marchand was also drowned.
