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

When the face is of an "angelic" cast of countenance an dthe hair long and luxuriant there is no more effective way of arranging it than in a coronet braid. To comb it in this manner, braid the hair in two braids at the base of the head, leaving a soft pompadour in front. Cross the braids at the back and bring them about the head to the front. Tuck the ends under and pin them firmly in place. If desired, the hair may be parted over the brow

over the brow.

Another simple arrangement is to part the hair at the side or thru the middle and to coil the ends into two flat rolls like snall shells. Pin each

flat rolls like snail shells. Pin each coil securely in place and use a plain comb above them.

Of course, I need not emphasize the importance of keeping the hair in a healthy condition when the school girl is at the "awkward age."

This is asother story which will have to be told another day. For the present spend hours if necessary finding an arrangement of the hair that will prove becoming to the girl of 14 or 16.

Extra Early Tomato Plants

The first sowing should be made early in March, and the directions are the same as for cabbage. CHIROPRACTORS NOT ALLOWED TO REPLY

Justice Hodgins Says Reference to Cult as "Quacks" Only Matter of Opinion.

The chiropractors were not allowed to reply to the criticisms of the Dr. Flexinger report at the medical commission yesterday morning. Mr. Justice Heigins took the view that the only real charge made in thu report was a reference to the cult as "quacks," and that, he declared, was only a matter of opinion. The report in question said the osteopathic and chiropractic schools were improperly "We should be allowed to contradict

those statements," said one of the chiropractors present. "Not here," replied his lordship. 'I will see Dr. Flexinger but cannot make certain statements regarding his re-port and he not here to reply." Glynn Osler, K.C., representing the drugless healers said that the report was regarded as wholly misleading.
'Such unverified evidence put my clients in a false position. Dr. Flexinge should appear and be submitted to cross examination." Adjournment was

Two Members of Fownes Firm Will Serve Terms in Prison.

LONDON, Feb. 14. At the Old Bailey today, William Gardiner Rig-den was fined £500, William Fownes Rigden was sentenced to 12 months imprisonment, and Stanley Fownes Rigden to four months' impresonment, on their withdrawing their former defence and pleading guilty to the charge of obtaining goods from Germany thru their New York branch and trading in such goods in contravention of the Trading with the Enemy Act. The three men are partners of Fownes Brothers and Company, glove manufacturers.

For cleaning garments of worsted materials use dry kitchen salt in this manner. Crush the salt with a pin and fine wire rolling thru a fine wire sieve to remove the lumps. Lay the garment flat on a table, sprinkle it with salt, and, using a piece of clean, white linen folded into a pad, rub the salt well into the fabric. Rub the goods only one way, that is, with the nap, using

long, even strokes. When every inch of the surface has been cleaned with the salt remove it with a stiff brush. If the hem or any other part of the garment still shows The most delicate frocks can be cleaned by the salt method, but lace yokes, sashes and other accounts.

Souse it up and down on a large table over which a clean cloth has been spread. Have ready a pad of clean linen, dip it into the gasoline, and go over the gown, rubbing the right way of the material. Keep for several minutes, then spread it out

the pad continually wet. When the the pad continually wet. When the sown has been thoroly gone over, dip it into the gasoline, and if necessary use a soft brush to remove the soil about the hem. Squeeze the gown gently and rinse in a basin containing lean gasoline. Squeeze between the nands and hang it in the air to dry. During the process of drying pull the nands and hang it in the air to dry.
During the process of drying pull the crock carefully into shape, paying special attention to the lace and ribbon.
When it has hung in the air for two nours press with a warm iron.
Gloves are easily cleaned, particularly if you invest in one of the wooden cleaning forms. Slip the glove over ne form and then take a soft-bristl-

cleaning forms. Slip the glove over ne form and then take a soft-bristled brush and scrub it until every trace of soil has departed. If badly soiled, ub the bristles of the brush over a ake of pure white soap, then dip in asoline, and scrub the soiled glove igorously. When aech glove is thorously cleaned rinse it in fresh gasoline and hang in the air to dry.

Use this same method when cleaning satin or kid slippers.

When furs need cleaning use hot bran or cornmeal. Heat the bran or

bran or cornmeal. Heat the bran or meal so that it can be comfortably borne to the touch and rub it well into the fur. When the bran has cooled repeat the process with a second lot. Finally, brush the fur and shake out the bran and wipe the fur with damp cloth to remove the bran dust. To have the best success with your dry cleaning do it on a bright, sunny


