RESULT OF B. C. VOTE SYMPTOM OF POLITICS

In Ottawa, Taken to Indicate Unsettled Conditions in Canadian Arena.

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—(By Canadian Press).—Results in the provincial elections in British Columbia yesterday are regarded here as symptomatic of the generally unsettled conditions in Canadian politics. While the Ontario government is returned, it is noted that the administration may be largely dependent for its existence on support of the independent group. Following the B. C. provincial elections of 1916, the standing of political parties was: Liberals 37, Conservatives 9, Socialist 1. With 15 candidates already elected, the Conservatives have, therefore, improved their position as compared with 1916. But the independent group, now numbering seven, will be very considerably stronger.

Considered as a whole, the results are taken to imply a breaking away from the old parties and the probable rise of group government.

MINISTER FLARES UP ON "DRY" INSPECTION Scene at New Brunswick Alliance Meeting Precipitated by Demand for Probe.

St. John, N.B., Dec. 2.—An angry demand for an investigation into the administration of the New Brunswick prohibition act, under Rev. W. D. Wilson, who has just resigned the chief inspectorship, was made by Rev. W. R. Robinson, a prominent Baptist clergyman, before the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance today. Mr. Wilson has just been appointed by the executive of the alliance as paid secretary of the organization. Mr. Robinson declared the chief inspector had made an investigation into charges made on the authority of one of the assistant inspectors. He knew that in his position, he was an "adulterer and a thief."

After an excited debate the convention recommended appointment of Mr. Wilson as secretary.

Mr. Robinson then rose, saying: "I can tell you that there will be a full investigation. I am branded as a liar before the people of the province. I have a little snubhood left and I promise you that all the facts will come out." He left the room and did not return.

INCOME TAX AND SUBSIDY. Last year the provincial income tax in British Columbia brought in \$1,600,000. The subsidy from the federal government amounted to \$623,000.

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GRAVENHURST HAS OFFER OF FREEPORT

Kitchener Despatch Tells Offer of Waterloo County Health Association.

Kitchener, Ont., Dec. 2.—(Special).—It was announced here today that directors of the Waterloo County Health Association has offered the use of the Freeport Sanatorium to Gravenhurst and have been informed by the Gravenhurst authorities that a decision will be made as soon as possible with regard to their acceptance or rejection of the invitation. The chamber of commerce membership drive is proceeding favorably here. Reports today indicate over 100 new members with the rest of the week in which to conclude the work. Fred Brechtel, a local doctor, who ran amuck here this morning and smashed up a local restaurant, was remanded by Magistrate Weir, pending examination by a physician.

WEEK-END MARKET CLOSED UP DRAGGY

Lambs a Shade Easier—Run Was Very Light.

With a very light run of cattle at the Union Yards yesterday the market was unchanged, the bulk of the stuff being cleared up steady with Wednesday's prices. Among the receipts were four loads of wassach cattle, of medium quality and which sold at \$10 to \$11 on the whole, while the market was not active, prices may be said to have held steady in all lines. The stocker and feeder trade during the week and yesterday, where sales were made, feeders weighing 1000 lbs., sold around from \$6 to \$6.25 a pound, good and better around 900 lbs. sold from \$6 to \$6.25, with the lighter kind selling at 7c to 8c, and common at 5c.

The bull trade is very quiet, good bulls selling from 7c to 8c, common heavy bulls 5c to 6c and light bulls 4c to 4.5c. The milkers and springers are slow unless they are the better kind.

The calf trade has been slow all week with choice veal selling at 16c to 17c; medium calves, 14c to 15c; common veal, 10c to 12c, and grassers 8c to 9c a pound. The heavy and light calves of sale and common men are moving their shippers in this class.

The lamb trade has been a shade or two stronger all week, choice lambs selling on Wednesday at 13c, but on Thursday they eased off to 12c to 13c, and heavy fat sheep and bucks from 6c to 7c. The market this week has been well cleared up, and the sheep and lamb trade is slow, but outside of common rumormongers as to next week's prices little definite is known.
