Among the gentlemen who contributed to the amusement of the children were the captains of the several ferry boats, Mr. Fleming, of Brampton, and the cabmen of the city, the little ones being treated with excursions to Lorne Park, the Island, and High Park. This, with the continued liberality of the butchers, bakers, market-gardeners, and confectioners, is gratefully acknowledged in the Report. The Treasurer's Report was then read, showing the disbursements for the current year to be \$6,408.72, which includes repairs to the building, amounting to over \$500, salaries, etc., while the receipts, including a balance of \$701.32 carried forward from last year, a balance of \$182.92, on hand, besides money in bank and otherwise invested, amount to \$6,593.91.

After reading the Report, Ald. Boswell made a few remarks, and referred to the workshop, which he hoped would yet be established. He then moved the adoption of the Report, which was seconded by Mr.

Godson, and unanimously adopted.

Archdeacon McMurray, of Niagara, then stated that of the 1,600 children brought out by Miss Rye not three per cent. had gone astray,

and this was certainly very gratifying.

During the evening the children rendered several amusing songs, Miss Ritchies presiding at the organ; and after the singing of the national anthem, prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Cayley, and the meeting closed.
