FAMILY AS INSTITUTION TO PROMOTE PUBLIC WELFARE; ADDRESS AT N. H. SOCIETY

The Ladies' Association of the Natural History Society have had a very interesting series of addresses on The Economics of the Family, for the benefit of the Red Cross Fund. There has been a good attendance at each meeting. The last address of the series was given yesterday by A. M. Belding, who discussed the family as an institution to promote public welfare.

He pointed out the relation between the family life and the community life, and the necessity for developing a community spirit to deal with community problems. Home training should develop a due regard for the law of sacrifice and service, and a recognition of the need of special co-operation between all the families of the community to promote social welfare. Many homes contribute only to the ill-being of the community, and there is therefore the greater burden upon the more favored homes, which must unite to develop the community spirit, arouse a community conscience, and promote needed reforms. In this connection the speaker referred to the need of a strong and well supported Children's Aid Society, an industrial farm for drunkards and other delinquents, better housing, and better provision for the physical, mental and moral development of the boys and girls. The concluding portion of the address was as follows:

"The family can best contribute to public welfare by sending forth young men and women not merely strong in body and mind and morals, but conscious of their relations to the community and eager to put their ability to the test in living service, along broad lines, without prejudice, and without fear of criticism. In the effort to make the world sweeter for all who desire, and have the capacity under favorable conditions, to develop the higher manhood and womanhood and the finer fruits of community life. It goes without saying that in such a home the heads of the household would realize their duty, and while developing at home a right conception of the relation of the family to the community would realize an illustration of what it involves by their personal interest in community welfare work. Thus may the family become a real factor in the promotion of public welfare."

Solution of Community Problems.

"Community problems can only be solved by community effort, or co-operation. People must put aside their prejudices, place the emphasis upon those things upon which they are agreed, and by their united strength remove the barriers to social progress. Home instruction can do no more useful thing in the community sense than to teach the members of a family to seek for the finer elements in the nature of others, to disregard minor points of difference, and endeavor to find a common ground of action for the public good. If on the other hand we magnify differences of race, of religion, of social position, and encourage the growth of narrow views, developing a spirit of pride and aloofness, rather than one of friendly co-operation, we are injuring instead of promoting public welfare, and robbing the family life itself of an opportunity."

MUST PAY RENT FOR SIDEWALK OPENING

New Measure Adopted by Council—Old Dispute Settled—Engineer's Report Submitted—The Vacant Lands

At the meeting of the common council yesterday a letter from former Commissioner M. E. Agar, protesting against statements by Commissioner Potts that bills contracted before he took office were still coming in, was read. Com. Potts said that this was correct, but that they were all small items of less than \$25.

Com. Potts asked that a transit be purchased for his department and charged to the water and sewerage department. The mayor explained that this was the outcome of an old dispute regarding the ownership of the instrument and advised Com. Potts to buy a new one and charge it to his own department.

The by-law imposing rental charges on openings in sidewalks used as coal cellars, etc., and for lighting purposes

not only on those for which permission is granted in future but on all those now in existence, was passed and ordained and becomes law in thirty days. Tenders were opened for piping for the Adelaide Road extension work and left with the commissioner of water and sewerage and the mayor with power to act.

The annual report of the city engineer was adopted but contained no recommendations. Mr. Murdoch reported the North End survey to date cost \$8,184.70 and that 418 miles had been covered but that the work could not be finished in
