Ehrlich Immunity Theory Must Be Discarded, Say Two Groups of Scientists; Under-Feeding of Cancer Patients Suggested

ALBANY, N. Y., April 2—Modern science must cast away the Ehrlich theory of immunity from diseases upon which great advances in the development of serums and anti-toxins have been made in the last 25 years. That was the word which two groups of scientists who were working in laboratories separated by thousands of miles each without knowledge of what the other was doing, brought to the American Association of Immunologists, continuing, its meeting here today.

TELLS OF EXPERIMENTS Dr. W. H. Manwaring, professor of bacteriology and experimental pathology at Sanford University, California, said experiments he and his assistants had conducted showed Ehrlich's theory of specific receptors to be untenable.

Dr. Manwaring assumed that the cells instead give off substances which, with the help of ferments in the blood, fit themselves around the poisons, neutralizing their effects.




