

## MANY TO WRITE EXAMINATIONS

Matriculation, Teachers' and High School Leaving Papers Next Week

Will Begin Tuesday Morning and Continue Until Thursday Afternoon.

There will be 279 candidates writing examination papers in the Saint John High School during the coming week. Inspector G. J. Marr announced last night. They are drawn from Kings, Queens, Saint John and Charlotte counties. There will be 146 writing the matriculation examinations, four writing high school leaving, and 25 writing examinations for teachers' superior license and candidates writing Normal School entrance will be as follows:

Class one, 82; class two, 64; class three, eight. In addition eight candidates will write the Normal School entrance examinations for class one at St. Vincent's Convent, making a total of 277 writing examinations in the city. Amongst those who will assist Mr. Marr as supervising examiner at the High School will be H. C. Ricker.

The examinations will commence at 9 o'clock on Tuesday morning and the time tables will all be on daylight time. The matriculation examinations will be as follows: Tuesday morning, English literature, and in the afternoon, English grammar, algebra and arithmetic; Wednesday morning, Latin and chemistry, and in the afternoon, English grammar, algebra and arithmetic; Thursday morning, geometry and botany, and in the afternoon, history and geography; Friday, French, optional, and algebra, and in the afternoon, physiology, optional.

The time table for High School leaving examinations will be as follows: Tuesday morning, English literature, and in the afternoon, algebra; Wednesday morning, arithmetic and nature study, and in the afternoon, English grammar; Thursday morning, geometry and botany, and in the afternoon, writing and drawing and optional French.

The candidates writing examinations for superior license have only two papers to write on Tuesday morning on practical mathematics, and the other on Tuesday afternoon on Latin.

## YOUTH IS FOUND DEAD IN A BOAT

Head in Water—Drowns After Being Seized With Dizzy Spell.

SACO, July 4.—The funeral of James D. Wilson Jr., 16-year-old son of James D. Wilson of Washington, D. C., who was found dead in a boat Tuesday on the Saco river in the vicinity known as the big boom, was held from the home of his aunt, Mrs. Rufus Dearborn, 55 Middle street, Friday afternoon.

The boy, when discovered by log drivers who were at work in that vicinity, was leaning out of the boat with his head and chest in the water while the remainder of the body was in the boat. It is believed that he was seized with one of the dizzy spells to which he was subject while out fishing.
