CURIOUS HABITS

OF BIRDS IN THE BELGIAN CONGO

J. P. Chapin Tells of His Studies of Birds in Equatorial Regions—The White Rhino is Black.

Birds that make their habitat in the Belgian Congo, in the dense forest and high grass regions of Central Africa, were described lucidly and interestingly by Jas. P. Chapin of the American Museum of Natural History, New York, speaking before the Royal Canadian Institute, Toronto, on Saturday evening.

Mr. Chapin, who is assistant curator of the Department of Ornithology in the Museum, went to the Congo with Herbert Lang of the Museum in 1909, to make collections of the wild life of that country, for use in the Museum. The most part of the five and a half years he was away were spent in Central Africa, in the northeastern part of the Belgian Congo. With the exception of two years' service with the United States army in France, Mr. Chapin has spent the time since his return from Africa in making a careful study of the native African birds. He has recently come back from a trip to Europe, where he visited the various natural history museums to examine their specimens of "these birds."

A large part of the country wherein Mr. Chapin studied bird life lies in the equatorial forest stretching from Uganda to the West Coast, while to the north and south of this forest country the land is covered with high grass.

WATCH REPAIRERS

FINE WATCH REPAIRING A specialty. Watches, Clocks, and Jewellery. The advance in time recently recorded in the states has not yet been felt on the local market, as our dealers here follow the lead of the Canadian mills and so far, these have not advanced quotations on commercial products. With U. S. mill prices higher, the difference in exchange works to the advantage of Canadian dealers and the ultimate price to consumers here remains virtually the same.

No change is noted in the general condition of the non-ferrous metal situation, but the undertone is improved as a result of the better inquiry of the metal week. There is a feeling that consumers are showing a little anxiety regarding the future and may desire to protect themselves against a possible advance caused by curtailed output.

Pig iron is the one local commodity that has been directly influenced by existing conditions. Canadian producers report a heavy demand for pig and bar iron and in extra thin plasters. The movement of machine tools remains at a low level, dealers stating that an occasional sale is made, but that no big business is in prospect. The encouraging factor in this line is in small supplies and reports indicate that the volume of sales is not only held, but in many instances gradual improvement is shown.

In old materials the market continues unchanged, with prices firm and demand light. Dealers are encouraged, however, by the better movement in commercial materials and feel that this will eventually influence the buying of scrap.

The coal strike is the main influencing factor in respect to developing conditions in the steel and metal industries, and while no serious effect is yet noted, the passage of raw material supplies, may create a condition that will require some able handling to prevent a tie-up throughout the entire country.

WORLD'S OLDEST UNIVERSITY.

The oldest university in the world is in China. In that country scholarship was held in high regard in the days when European nations were just emerging from savagery. The White Deer Grotto University in Kiangsi province, four hundred miles up the Yangtze River Valley, was founded in 980 A.D., and antedates Salerno, the oldest European university, by some time. As a school it was opened about 900 A.D. It received its name from a famous poet, Li Po, who wrote in the eighth century came with his brother to the lovely spot where the university was afterwards built. Li Po had a white deer that earned for him the name of Pei Lu Siensan, or White Deer Gentleman. He and his brother made their home in a cave that has been known ever since as Pei Lu Dong, the White Deer Grotto. In the fourteenth century an image of the deer, hewn out of stone, was placed there, and there it remains to this day.
