

APPOINTMENT OF CABINET MAN FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

Ottawa, Nov. 26—At least half a dozen pressing and several more less urgent problems await the return of Sir Robert Borden. The first of an important series of cabinet meetings will be held on Thursday. Two matters of urgency relate to the plans for the hand-

ment to relieve soldiers in need of aid during the winter months, and a declaration of the government's policy in re-

g regard to war time prohibition and other war time orders-in-council.

It is pointed out that the government can at any time it desires repeal any orders-in-council passed under the authority of the war measures act and if it is decided that the act does not cease to be effective on Dec. 1, this course may be adopted in regard to some of them.

It is presumed that a minister from New Brunswick to succeed Hon. F. B. Carvell will soon be named. The name of Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen has been mentioned on several occasions.

284 MEN PLACED IN COLLEGE BY K. C.

Tech Leads in Number of Order's Students—Ex-service Men From Every State Are on The List

New York, Nov. 26—Men from every state in the union are among the 284 ex-soldiers and ex-sailors who have been placed in various colleges throughout the country to be educated at the expense of the Knights of Columbus.

out of a total of 3,000 applications for the scholarships offered to veterans of the war last August, 967 applicants succeeded in preliminary examination. More than 300 of these qualified. It was assumed by the order that eventually 400 of the 967 would be awarded the scholarships.
