GUARD AGAINST WEAK-MINDED

Mental Hygienists Form Toronto Branch of National Committee

(Toronto Globe.)

The formation of a committee to take steps for the organization of a Toronto branch of the organization was the result of a meeting of the Canadian National Committee for Mental Hygiene, held through the kindness of Mrs. W. B. Meikle, at her home, with Professor Peter Sandford in the chair.

Dr. Clarence M. Hincks, secretary of the National Committee, outlined very briefly the work that has been done since the organization was formed in April last. In view of the fact that over 5,000 soldiers had been returned to Canada suffering from mental and nervous disorders, the military aspects of the work were particularly worthy of consideration.

The necessity not only of efficient treatment in suitable hospitals, but also of a follow-up system for discharged patients had been evident, and representations to this effect made to the Invalid Soldiers' Commission had resulted in the consent of that body to the ap-
