SENATE BLOCKS THE PROHIBITION BILL

Ottawa, July 7.—In the House this morning, Mr. Meighen moved that the House insist on its disagreement with the senate amendment to the amending the criminal code in respect to sexual offences. The effect of the senate amendment under discussion, Mr. Meighen thought, would have the effect of saving instruction given to the jury that unless they were of opinion that the man was wholly or chiefly to blame, they should acquit. The motion carried.

Several Others Also go Over Till Next Session of Parliament

Mr. Robert Borden, speaking of the prohibition bill and the bill to continue the war purchasing committee, said they could not be passed during the present session. The war purchasing committee would, however, be maintained under the order-in-council creating it, which would remain in force for the time being. Suggestions made would be considered during the recess.

Under the circumstances, the bill cannot become law during the present session, but another session will probably be held before the order-in-council expires.

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LOCAL NEWS

NO STEAMSHIP CONNECTION

The board of trade has received a communication from Toronto asking if there is any steamship connection between St. John and Porto Rico and Domingo. A reply has been sent to the effect that the West India steamers plying from this port do not touch these ports.

RESOLUTION WAS RECEIVED

The resolution of sympathy with the co-religionists in Poland and Roumania, which was passed by Jewish citizens of St. John, and which was forwarded by the mayor some time ago, has been received by the secretary of state and presented to the council, according to a letter received by Mayor Hayes this morning.

Condon is succeeding Mr. Quirt in the local office.

The St. John District Lodge, I. O. G. T., met at Nerepis, N. B., with Salmon Rock Lodge, District Chief Temple B. K. Kistick presiding. Salmon Rock Lodge have a new hall well underway and in the afternoon supper was served. The hall is thirty-five feet long and twenty feet wide, and when they have the new manufacturing beer will be held for dedication.

STABBING CASE IN MINTO

Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson received a telephone message from Minto yesterday to the effect that there had been a stabbing affray between two Austrians in that place. It is possible, he said, that some person or persons may be manufacturing beer or liquor of some kind there, and with this in view, Sub-Inspector Saunders left Minto yesterday morning, and will thoroughly investigate the case. The telephone message indicated that the quarrel was connected with some trouble over liquor which the Austrians had.

THANKSGIVING SERVICES

Services of thanksgiving for the signing of peace were carried out in all the churches in the British Empire yesterday. In the Catholic churches exposition of the Blessed Sacrament was held in the Cathedral and St. Peter's. The Rev. Deum was sung after vespers.
