
MORNING WAR SUMMARY



Closing the Pincers.

South of Valenciennes in France Field Marshal Haig's forces, notwithstanding stiff opposition, have advanced their line in the general operation which has in view the capture of Valenciennes and pressing on toward Mons and Maubeuge in the general converging movement that is going on between Belgium and the region north of Verdun.

Farther south, from the Oise river to the region of Rethel, the French have gained a signal victory by forcing a retreat of the enemy in the big salient north of Laon and are threatening to cause the collapse of the entire German line eastward through a fast turning movement. American troops have been thrown into the line near Rethel and have advanced nearly a mile and taken numerous prisoners. The German war office admits the success of the thrust of the French between the Oise and Serre rivers and says that the German lines
