MUNITION ORDERS OF MORE THAN BILLION

\$875,000,000 Already Expended by Imperial Board in Canada—More Than 250,000 Employed

Toronto, Feb. 24.—Through the imperial munitions board orders have been placed in Canada for \$1,100,000,000 worth of munitions, and the sum of \$875,000,000 already has been expended in re- spect of these orders in plants estab- lished in every province of Canada outside of P. E. I.

The first statement was made by Hon. N. W. Rowell, president of the imperial munitions board, in the course of an address to a number of Detroit business men who were the guests at a dinner given by the Toronto Association Saturday night.

He said there were between 600 and 800 munitions plants in the dominion, employing between 250,000 and 300,000 workers, including as many as 35,000 women at one time.
