Montreal Shipping Federation Will Submit Demands of St. John Longshoremen to Government Board

Montreal, Sept. 25.-At a meeting of the Montreal Shipping Federation held yesterday afternoon it was decided to comply with the request of the longshoremen of the port of St. John and ask the dominion government to appoint a board of arbitration to deal with the demands made by the longshoremen and other workers connected with the Montreal ports, for increased wages and improved conditions of labor.

DEATH LIST FIVE AULAC SMASH

Moncton, N. B., Sept. 25.-With the death of the driver of the Whelan-Banks, head brakeman on the east bound freight train which was wrecked in a head-on collision near Aulac, Tuesday afternoon, the list of fatalities now stands at five, all of them railway employees.

TITLE FORMS PRINTED HERE

Who had held the titles of the land until then - T. C. Ansell & Co. - With where did you dine in Edson? - With Mrs. Lloyd of the place he said was his residence.

In going to the land titles at Edson, did you go up or down hill? - I went on the level. You must remember I've been sleeping with a newspaper for a pillow this last month, and it's pretty hard to get my memory working as it should.

Where did you write letters while in Edson? - At Mr. Lloyd's house.

Counsel for the prosecution here exhibited letters from issues to Miss Edson May 14 from Edson, and asked witness:

Mr. Baxter produced a title deed previously over to him, which had been procured by him from M. A. Smith at the Edson land office.

Mr. Baxter: How could Mr. Smith have been so careless as to record this time as 11 a.m. when you did not arrive at Edson until 1:15? - I don't know, it's up to him.

A pause in the questioning ensued and the witness said: "I don't know, it's up to him."

"Now, Isaac, I want you to do some writing for me. Take a pen and paper and write the name and address of your wife in Boston."

"My wife in Boston?" commenced Mr. Barry, counsel for the prisoner, jumped to his feet.

"I object to that question and that demand, Your Honor," he said, "as entirely irrelevant and as pertaining to another and entirely different case."

"Another case entirely. Well, then, if you would rather not write down that name of the woman with whom you were in St. John. Either one will do - we don't care which."

"But I object to that question as absurd under the law," argued Mr. Barry. "My learned friend is asking the prisoner to write down the name of one of his two wives. Now, a man may not have two wives under the law; therefore the question is not a legal one."

"I amend the question, then," said Mr. Baxter. "To witness: 'Write down the name of the woman with whom you went through the form of marriage in Boston, then?'"

"I object to that question, too," said Mr. Barry.

The objection was sustained and counsel for the prisoner said that it would be better to write down the following sentence: "Dierckx Asbestos Company, a Foreign Mission, and an address of the title deed to the property in question."

You had never procured a duplicate certificate of title? - Not until the land was paid for.

The land was not paid for? - I had paid nine thousand dollars on the property by May 14.

Mr. Baxter then asked the witness to examine the photograph carefully and notice the way in which "registrar" was spelled. It was spelled "registrar." Counsel then called attention to the writing done by witness a few minutes before in which "registrar" was spelled "registor" and also "Registrator."

Continuing: - When you had suspicions of the title, did you write to Edmonston? - Yes; four times.

And you received replies? - No; I did not.

And you mean to tell me that a big land office like that at Edmonston, which had hundreds of people working there, would neglect to answer important letters such as yours evidently were? - No; I don't say that. They might have been intercepted.

After a long argument between counsel, the court said that the evidence presented by the province of Saskatchewan was admitted as evidence, but the prisoner objecting, the score that he might commit himself by answering questions pertaining to them, the clerk of the court was instructed to write in his journal that the answers of the witness were not to be held against him at any future court proceeding.

Mr. Baxter then asked: - Do you see the watermark on these titles? - Yes, it's Century Ledger.

Did you or did you not have these certificates of title printed at Knodell's printing office in St. John? - I will not swear I did, and I will not swear I didn't.

Well, could you conceive of your having official documents of the province of Saskatchewan printed for your own use in St. John? - No; I can't say I can.

This closed the cross-examination of Isaacs by the prosecution.

Mr. Baxter then asked the court if the prosecution might be permitted to reopen their case for the purpose of hearing the evidence of George Knodell. The question was taken by Justice White under advisement during the recess at noon.
