DESERVING OF REWARD

IS CAMPBELLTON'S MAYOR

During the exacting time of the fire, when everyone was to a greater or less degree, thinking of his own future, and all were busy, one town official seemed to forget himself and devoted his entire time, night and day working in the interests of the town and his fellow citizens, and working without hope or thought of remuneration other than the commendation of his fellow townsfolk. That official was Mayor Murray.

With his office in a shack he was busy from early morning until late at night directing the work of various departments and seeing that matters were being properly looked after. During the first six weeks his practice was neglected and virtually lost, but never a word of complaint was heard. He kept at his work until he was able to hand it over to others competent to look after it.

We understand that the matter of presenting some slight token of appreciation to his worthy helpmate has been discussed among the members of the relief committee and should come spontaneously from the relief committee and also the citizens of the town at large through the town council.

About 200 years ago a London goldsmith called Trotting, made and presented to the city of his heart on his birthday anniversary a thimble of gold, beautifully ornamented and chased, accompanied by a note which introduced the little contraption as a "token of my humble esteem which shall protect those delicate, fair and industrious fingers from prick and tear of needle head." That was the origin of the thimble.

A Country Preacher's Experience

(World's Work)

A young country preacher, an educated and devoted man, not long ago went to the president of a college and told this story:

"I wish to serve my fellow-men, but I must find some other way to do it than in the pulpit. I should like to become a member of your college 'extension' force, to teach people.

"For four years I have had charge of two country churches. In each community there are three other starved churches and three other starved preachers. These people who 'maintain' these four churches in each community could all be served by one church or at most by two churches; and they could maintain one preacher or two. But now both their financial and their spiritual strength is divided to starvation.

"I have no personal complaint to make. I am a bachelor, and my meagre income is enough for me. But I can do little good. The conditions are artificial and abnormal. Religiously, a small community is divided into four little groups, each too weak seriously to form any real fellowship; and these four groups of good people, if not openly hostile, are at least jealous of one another.

"And this is not the worst of it. My church by its financial system puts a duty on me that I am unwilling to perform. It unwittingly compels me to do what I regard as wrong. I must acquiesce in the fact that these poor people are appointed to these four churches, and that they are to be maintained by the church government, the educational fund, etc. They haven't the money to give; but I find myself a sort of tax-collector without regard to their ability to pay. This is economically wrong, and, therefore, spiritually wrong."

LONDON TO BOMBAY IN WEEK OR EIGHT DAYS

Trans-Caspian Railroad Scheme Being Taken up by International Company

London, Nov. 23--Events are shaping towards a realization of the late Count De Lesseps' scheme for a trans-Caspian railroad connecting the Russian and Indian lines, which failed in the early eighties in consequence of clashing Russian and British political antagonism. Mr. Zevinstoff, a member of the Russian Duma, who is now interested in behalf of a powerful and wealthy Russian financial group is trying to arrange it.

It is proposed to form an international company, in which Russia, Great Britain and Persia will be predominant, but in which France, Germany and other interests will be welcomed. It is proposed to build 1,600 miles of line at an estimated cost of £2,000,000. It is figured that passengers and mail can be carried by the proposed road from London to Bombay in seven or eight days. Connections would be made at Baku, Namski, Belchistan, where the British have built a line.

POVERTY FLED UNDER LOCAL OPTION LAW

Remarkable Changes for Good the Effect Felt in Orillia, Ont.

Toronto, Nov. 23--What local option has done for Orillia was the theme of an address by John C. Miller, manufacturer, of that town, before the Canadian Temperance League in Massey Hall. Mr. Miller is just back after a fortnight's temperance campaigning in Saskatchewan.

He declared that local option in Orillia, in force over two years, has been a success, the law having been enforced by a sympathetic police force, magistrate and town council. As a result, population has increased, and so have property values, while every manufacturer has signed a document that business conditions have been better because legitimate trade is no longer in competition with the bootlegger. Hotel accommodation had improved. In the six months prior to local option the crown attorney from Barrie had come to Orillia fourteen times on business, but not once in the succeeding six months.

Mr. Miller is an ex-member of Orillia's finance committee. Before local option he said, the town had a bank overdraft of \$11,000 because of unpaid taxes; eight months ago, this had been reduced to \$1,000. The ladies and societies of the churches used to collect funds each year for distribution among the town poor. Last Xmas they reported there was no body that required assistance.

ALL BRITISH GOODS

Union Jack Industrial League Makes its Influence Felt

London, Nov. 23--An All-British shopping week is now being held at Ealing, under the joint auspices of the Union Jack Industrial League and the borough Chamber of Commerce. The main streets of Ealing are gaily decorated with national flags, streamers and bunting, and large tickets bearing the inscriptions "British made," "British grown," or "British produce" are to be seen in every shop window.

The opening ceremony took place in the courtyard of the town hall, Viscount Hill, in explaining the aims of the Union Jack Industrial League, said that it was a non-political association. The purpose of the movement was to promote a wider preference for British and colonial goods, and to encourage home industries.

The Chambers of Commerce of some twenty provincial towns, including Exeter and Nottingham, have sent deputations to Ealing to inspect and report on the present experiment, and several districts around London are already contemplating similar celebrations.

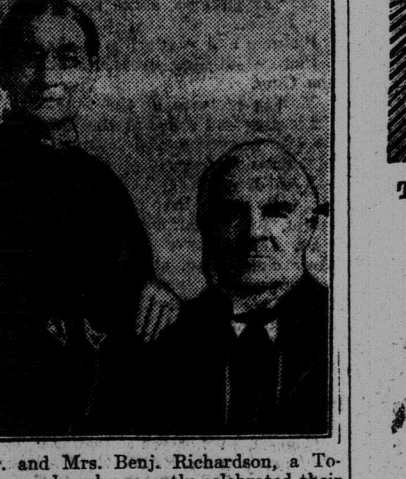
