FOREST FIRES BURN 25 NOVA SCOTIA BUILDINGS

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 14.—Tremendous forest fires are raging on the southwestern shore of Nova Scotia, from Port Clyde, Shelburne, to within eight miles of the town of Liverpool. The fire has been burning for two or three days, but yesterday and today burst out in greater strength.

At Port Clyde, twenty-five buildings were destroyed. The territory between the two points mentioned is not all in flames, but there is a continuous chain of fires which is doing vast damage.

Nathaniel Sears, of Port Clyde, who lost a house and barn, is missing and grave apprehension is felt for his life.

Paris, Aug. 14.—Pierre Veinier, winner of the Paris Madrid race, accomplished yesterday the first of ten flights intended to prove the possibility of a aeromail service. He left Issy Les Moulineux at 5:07 and reached Beauville, which is near Troy, at 12:12 miles from Issy, at 6:50. It takes express trains three hours and twelve minutes to make the distance. Veinier dropped messages at Mantel Sur Seine, Evreux and Lisieux. He received \$300 for the flight.

THIRTY ARE MISSING FROM THE FIREFHIRE
Aden, Arabia, Aug. 14.—The steamer Aden has arrived here, with 75 passengers and a portion of the crew of the steamer Fireshire, which sailed from Adelaide, Australia, July 14, for England, and which is ashore, lacking 20 miles south of Cape Guardafui, the easternmost point of Africa, at the entrance to the Gulf of Aden. Two of the Fireshire's boats with thirty persons are missing. A British transport has gone in search of them. The Fireshire belongs to the Elderline steamship company, of Glasgow. She is a vessel of 5,800 tons.
