

DOMINION MINISTERS MUST WAIT

United States Said to be Nervous About the Proposal.

ANSWER DEFERRED

Question Asked in British Commons Goes Over Till June 25.

London, May 21.—The vexed question of the appointment of a special Canadian representative at Washington, which has again come suddenly into the limelight with the publication of a remarkable article in the Daily Telegraph, and which was expected to come to a head yesterday, is not yet to be settled.

Lord Selborne had given notice that he would ask in the House of Lords for a statement from the government with regard to the appointment of a Free State minister plenipotentiary at the United States Capitol, but when question time came the answer was deferred "by request" until June 25, on the grounds that the government is still considering the question.

It is believed that the matter is still the subject of negotiation between the Foreign Office and the American Ambassador, the U. S. realizing fully the importance of the question, and the possibility that it may produce complications, since if a crisis were to arise the Federal government would be compelled to deal with the independent representatives of the various dominions which had special ministers, as well as with British herself.

The United States is also believed to be nervous about consenting to such an appointment, and may possibly revive her demand for production of the strongest possible proof that the interests of the Empire require such representation and are not seeking the naming of a minister plenipotentiary solely as a local political move.

Bank Inspector Died in Halifax

Halifax, N. S., May 21.—Philip Hood, 86, inspector for the Maritime Provinces of the Bank of Montreal, who has been relieving District Superintendent A. E. Nash here, died yesterday after a fortnight's illness. He was born in Yarmouth and entered the bank in 1904. He has since been stationed at Winnipeg, St. John's, Nfld., and Montreal. Mr. Hood is survived by his wife and two children residing in Montreal.

Jamaica Talks Of Retaliation

Kingston, Ja., May 21.—On the ground that the British Government has decided to break its agreement with regard to preferential rates, the Jamaica Legislative Council of Jamaica proposes to revise the Jamaican tariff in a manner which will materially benefit United States goods. Under the existing agreement, Jamaica exacts 25 per cent more duty on various foreign articles imported into the colony than on similar articles from Great Britain, and fifty per cent more in the case of cotton piece goods.

The small schooner Seaboy recovered yesterday the two anchors lost by the schooner, Vita A, when the latter went on a reef off Manawagonish Island last Friday. The anchors were lying on the reef and the men had difficulty in securing them. The Vita A will be moved further in the Market Slip and repairs to her bottom will be made. Her captain, Claude W. Parramore, expects to continue the voyage to New Haven with his lumber cargo the latter part of the week.
