INGERSOLL'S CIVIC HOLIDAY.

BETWEEN 800 AND 900 CITIZENS SPENT THE DAY AT PORT STANLEY.

Picnic at Victoria Park a Success—Base Ball Game and other sports.

Ingersoll's civic holiday this year will not soon be forgotten on account of the extremely hot weather, although it did not do the excursion to Port Stanley any harm. Between eight and nine hundred tickets were sold at the C. P. R. station here and about three hundred more at Putnam, Belmont, and Harrietsville. Those who are in a position to know say that there never was as large a crowd at the Port before.

Thousands of people attended the Irishmen's picnic, which was held yesterday, from London and other points.

Probably the most enjoyable part of the day's outing was the music by the 1st Light Infantry band, of Chicago, who are attending the old boys' re-union at London. Their music was of a high-class order and added greatly to the enjoyment of the vast concourse of folk.

During the day the steamer Ingersoll ran excursions out on the lake, and hundreds of people took advantage of the opportunity to spend a couple of hours enjoying the cool lake breezes.

The Foresters' band accompanied the excursionists from here.

The excursionists arrived at Ingersoll about 9:30 o'clock p. m.

The London Free Press says:—The picnic of this year was not so great as has been in point of numbers only. Returns at the local ticket offices show that a year ago one thousand more people or thereabouts from this city were at the picnic. Excepting last year, however, the event of yesterday has never been equalled in the number of people present. And it is quite probable that with the Ingersoll contingent on this occasion making up for the deficiency referred to, Port Stanley never saw a greater gathering.

About two hundred people attended the picnic at Victoria Park, under the auspices of the I. O. O. F. and S. O. E. in the afternoon, and considering the extremely hot sun, spent a pleasant time. A programme of sports was successfully carried out. Each contest brought out a number of contestants and the events were interesting.

Joe L. Vance and Jas. Adair won the quoit match. Hugh Davis and Joe McCarty were their opponents.

The watermelon hunt, for boys, blind folded, brought out a number of starters, and created considerable fun for the spectators. David Vance captured the melon.

Roland Briggs took first prize in the open bicycle race, and Jack Clark got the prize for being the last man to finish.

About twenty boys entered the soda biscuit eating contest, and their efforts to get away with the biscuit caused roars of laughter. A little fellow named English finished his first.

Tilly Vance captured the bag of candy given for the girls' race blindfolded.

In the boys' shoe race C. Clark took first, Chas. Clark second and Charlie Fuller third.

Boys' bicycle race—lat, James Knapp, last man finishing, Lorne Porter.

The red rooster, in the fowl race, had a very hot time of it. When he was let loose, about thirty boys, young men and old men pounced upon him, and it began to look like the rooster's finish. Finally the crowd loosened up and the cockerel was brought to light, minus nearly all his feathers, in Jack Roberts' firm grasp.

The catching of the greasy pig was somewhat of a disappointment to the spectators. The pig materialized, but the grease was not forthcoming. The squealer also refused to run and he was easily caught by Chas. McLean.
